### PLEASANT HOME

The Mount Hood Construction Co. has the road completed as far east as the pipe line at Geo. Lusted's. The switch at the crossing at D. D. Jack's place, we suggest should be called, Wayside, or Seneca, this being a central point east of Gresham. Nearly 45 families live within one-fourth of a mile, this being three-fourths of a mile from the road leading west from the village of Pleasant Home and one mile from Craswell's Crossing. The switch is located on the donation claim of Benjamin Cleggett. In the near future we hope for progress as never before. This is a county of great possibilities. We expect a Post Office and freight and passenger depot for carloads of feed are haul in this vicinity from the O. W. P.

This is a dairying country which is yet in its infancy. One properly equipped for the public is better than twelve halfway places. There are twelve crossings from Lusted's hill to Gresham, a distance of twelve miles. This is a scenic valley with Mount Hood majestically looking over us from the last of the Cascade Range.

E. R. Martin representing the American Sunday School Union having charge of the Upper Coast District was with Rev. A. B. Calder on Sunday last speaking at all three appointments. Revs. Martin and Calder are old time friends from Iowa.
