Portland, Ore., May 2 (Special)—To form a Central Oregon Development League, that shall be a wheel within a wheel, to work for the advancement of that particular part of the state, is the latest project along publicity lines. Chapman, of the Oregon Development League, has been at work the past week formulating plans for such an organization and the Prineville Commercial club will probably issue a call soon for a conference of the commercial bodies of Central Oregon on the subject.
