IN THE CAUSE OF TEMPERANCE

Drinking whisky is by no means
the only form of intemperance.
When a man eats so much that he
is in misery, he is intemperate.
When a woman is so intoxicated by
a novel that she sits up until the
"wee sma' hours" of the morning,
reading it, she is intemperate.
When a man who has an income of
but one dollar a day, lives at the
rate of a dollar and a half per day,
he is intemperate. When a woman
attends some society function and
then must perforce spend the next
forenoon in bed, and be all 'out of
sorts' all the afternoon, she is in-
temperate.

Intemperance, in any form, is a
sin, but, the drink evil is not made
better by proving that some other
things are bad. It will not excuse
me for stealing a horse, to prove
that I have a neighbor who steals
sheep.

Perhaps the brewer and saloon-
keeper are not responsible for all
the intemperance in Gresham. If
home is not the sort of a place to
attract the boy, he will of course
look for his pleasure elsewhere; if
he has not been taught habits of in-
dustry and thrift, it is reasonable
to suppose that he will waste both
his time and money in pursuit of
things which are not wise.

Idleness is a root which nourishes
most bad habits. When young
people are too busy to 'run the
streets' and grown men are too busy
to 'loaf,' when we stop considering
the world a great play house where
we only work in order to get time
and money for play; many present
day evils will have taken care of
themselves.

SUPPOSE!

Suppose you were a stranger in
Gresham, no friends to visit, didn't
happen to want to buy anything,
wasn't time to eat—where would
you go?

Suppose you were a young fellow
who didn't happen to be lame and
deaf and dumb, but the sort of a fel-
low who likes to be with other fel-
lows and occasionally to enjoy him-
self—what would you do?

Suppose you felt a little lonely
and 'down in the mouth,' the busi-
ness men were too busy to spend
their valuable time on you; the

town people hadn't discovered that
you were an angel in disguise, so
were not yet giving you the free-
dom of their homes; it wasn't the
right day to go to church, but you
knew that any old day or night was
all right for the saloon—what
would you be thinking?

Suppose that with our blows at
the liquor traffic, we should also
get busy and provide in Gresham,
some clean, wholesome place where
a boy could spend his time, and, at
the same time, not feel sneaking be-
cause he was there. Wouldn't it
be worth while?
