CLACKAMAS COUNTY NEWS.
The promoters of the Clackamas
Southern railroad have issued a
handsome prospectus with embossed
cover, describing in detail the coun-
try the road traverses, the system
evolved for financing the enter-
prise, and prospects of the road
when completed. The booklet is
handsomely illustrated and one is
available for every person inter-
ested in the rich Molalla Valley,
through which the road runs. The
prospectus describes the territory
the road traverses as follows:
Beginning at Oregon City, the
county seat of Clackamas county, a
city, and its suburbs of 8000 and
running southeasterly through a
thickly-populated and immensely
rich territory for six miles, it re-
aches the Beaver Creek settlement.
Directly tributary to this point are
the famous Clark and Highland
countries on the east, containing
millions of feet of fine timber, and
the Carus settlement on the west,
which is made up of many small
farms. Continuing south five miles,
through splendid farms and consid-
erable timber, the line passes
through Mullino. Radiating from
this point and directly tributary to
it, the Colton and Meadowbrook
countries, containing millions of feet
of magnificent fir, larch and hem-
lock, interspersed with hundreds of
well cultivated ranches.

"At this point the line enters the
far-famed Molalla Valley, and run-
ning south from Mullino two miles,
passes through Liberal, and in three
miles it reaches the town of Molalla,
the center trading point of the whole
valley. On the west lie the Macke-
burg and Needy settlements, made
up of small and well-farmed ranch-
es, and to the east and up the Mol-
alla river over six millions of the
finest timber stands waiting for a
means of transportation to market.
Continuing south, the line passes
through the Yoder settlement, the
Glad Tidings settlement, and
reaches Marquam in a distance of
nine miles, passing through the
finest farming sections in the whole
Northwest.
"From Marquam the line runs to
Silverton, the southern terminus, a
town of 2500 inhabitants, surround-
ed by thousands of acres of rich
farming and fruit land."

The booklet places the amount of
timber tributary to the road at 10,
000,000,000 feet, which does not
include the thousands of carloads
of piling, poles and cordwood which
would be hauled over the road.
There are now 36 sawmills, with a
capacity of 10,000 to 60,000 feet a
day, tributary to the line.

TO DO RIGHT**

When a man attempts to use his
vote and his influence toward free-
ing his country from the greatest
curse ever fostered and protected
by a civilized government, he is sure
to have to face that time worn argu-
ment—"Restraint of the liquor traf-
fic conflicts with a man's personal
liberty."
The term, personal liberty, has a
pleasing sound to the ear, but as a
fact, absolute personal liberty does
not exist, except perhaps it may be
exercised by the chieftain of some
savage tribe, or by some despotic
ruler of the Orient.

personal liberty. If you have a
fence or building directly in the
way of some road or improvement
wanted by the public and refuse to
move it, what will happen?
Let us grant for the sake of argu-
ment, that it should be allowable
for a man, if he so desires, to pur-
chase a barrel of rum, take it with
him to one of the South Sea Islands
or some other out of the way place
and drink himself to death. Is it
not quite another matter when every
lady in town must run the risk of
insult, when every individual, no
matter how clean he is trying to
keep his own life, must put up with
an offense to hearing, sight and
smell, when every boy is endan-
gered, the happiness of numberless
homes menaced and every taxpayer's
load made heavier because some of
the members of a community
wish to buy and sell or drink intox-
icating liquors?
