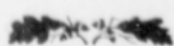

### Poultry Notes.

There are some fanciers who take their birds to the shows and win prizes with them and then let everybody know about them by advertising. There are other fanciers who carry out the first part of the program and then stop. Right there you have the difference between success and failure financially.

This is a world of compensations. The early broods may be small, but the pullets selected from them will lay when eggs are scarce and prices high. The later broods may be larger and more cheaply raised, but they must be wintered before becoming profitable egg producers. Foodstuffs may be high, but so are eggs and chickens. There is compensation all around.

Throwing vegetables upon the ground for the fowls results in a rolled-about dirty ball. To insure against this either hang up by strings to a nail or fasten on a board by a nail. This last is done by driving spike nails through a board, turning the spiked part up and sticking cabbage or turnips on these spikes. The fowls can neither trundle the board or vegetables about, but are satisfied to pick the spikes free of the vegetables.

When the farmer gets more for eggs and butter than he does now and the consumer pays less for both, will be when both get close together, with the middleman in butter and eggs eliminated from the situation. It can be done if you think so. Why don't both study out the way to get together? It is always somewhere between the two—the producer and consumer—in anything that great fortunes are made. We know the producer isn't making them, and neither is the consumer. Are both born to make fortunes easy for some middleman?—Ex.

It is easy just to slide along the line of the least resistance, to drift with the tide. What is the use of exerting yourself so strenuously to swim up stream when you can float down without effort?

It costs something to be original, inventive. It is much easier to imitate, to copy, to trail, than to lead.
