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INSPIRATION IN WORK

Are you planning and working to make the future better than the past? Do you write "Success" across the sky of your life each morning as you look out toward the rising sun? When you realize that you have failed do you muster new courage and determination and say, "I will do better next time?" when you grow weary in the toilsome way do you say, "A little rest and I'll be on the way again tomorrow?" The answer will show the trend of your life either upward or downward. Herein is hope and victory or defeat and despair.

When the gates of the State fair swing open on September 11 for a four-day meet, visitors will find conditions on the grounds vastly improved. A number of alterations that make for the comfort and convenience of visitors has been made. The camping grounds have been enlarged, the capacity of the stables has been doubled, the water system so improved that there is an abundance of water for all purposes, and the driveway from the railroad station to the entrance has been paved. This is the semi-centennial year of the state fair and an unusually large attendance is expected.

Bigger prizes and better exhibits than ever before are expected to bring crowds to the annual apple show to be held in Portland November 15-17. The apple crop of the state is excellent, and it is thought the various fruit districts will make a splendid showing. Big prizes will be offered by the Northern Pacific and the Great Northern railroads for the best district displays, a purse of \$250 being hung up by each line. This will be open to competition by any fruit district of the Pacific Northwest. Oregon communities will get in line and make fine displays of the fruit that is making the state famous and a treat is in store for those who like to see artistic displays of beautiful apples.

Irrigationists of Oregon will meet in Ontario September 28 and 29, during the progress of the Malheur County fair. The State Irrigation Association has called the meeting on those dates and there promises to be a large attendance from all parts of Oregon. Governor West expects to be present, as does Dr. James Withycomb, director of the Oregon Experiment Station at Corvallis, and the Portland Commercial club hopes to send a delegation.

Central Oregon Will Develop Horse Breeding Industry.

Steps have been taken by Central Oregon people to exploit one of the greatest resources of that region that has heretofore been neglected. This is the useful horse. To stimulate breeding of fine animals, the Central Oregon Livestock Sales Association has been formed, with headquarters at Redmond, and hereafter sales of horses will be held on the third Monday of each month at that point.

The object is to establish a big horse market, where breeders will come in touch with buyers and find fair prices for their stock. The organization is not for the benefit of Redmond alone, nor is it intended for the profit of association members, but it will help every section and community of Central Oregon, even to the rancher in the foothills.

The outside buyer, it is believed, will come to a sale where he can pick from a bunch of 400 or 500 head, when if he has to travel from ranch to ranch, he is not attracted. All classes of horses, from bronchos to the finest riding and draft horses, will be offered. Central Oregon has exploited its alfalfa, sheep, wool and cattle, but little has been said about its horses. Yet it produces thousands of fine animals, climate and all conditions being favorable to the best development of the horse, and the new plan will probably add to the importance of the industry.

RESOLUTION.

Be it resolved by the Common Council of the Town of Gresham:

That an act entitled "An act to amend paragraph 22 of section 12 of chapter 5 of the charter of the Town of Gresham, entitled an act to incorporate the Town of Gresham in the County of Multnomah, Oregon, and to provide a charter therefor, and to repeal all acts or parts of acts in conflict therewith," filed in the office of the Secretary of State, February 11, 1905, authorizing the Common Council of the Town of Gresham to issue and dispose of bonds of said town in an amount to not exceed \$20,000.00, to be used for the purpose of constructing, maintaining and operating general water works for the purpose of conducting and supplying water to the Town of Gresham, and the same hereby is submitted to the legal voters of the town of Gresham at a special election to be held on the 18th day of September, 1911, for their adoption or rejection. And each elector who votes upon said proposed amendment shall vote yes or no in answer to the following question:

Shall paragraph 22 of section 12 of chapter 5 of the charter of the town of Gresham be amended? And be it further resolved by the Common Council of the Town of Gresham:

That said proposed amendment to the charter of the town of Gresham be submitted to the electors of the town of Gresham at a special election for the town of Gresham, which said special election is hereby called for and ordered to be held on the 18th day of September, 1911, in the town of Gresham between the hours of 1 p. m. and 7 p. m., and the recorder of the town of Gresham is hereby required to give notice of said election by publication for two consecutive times in the general newspaper published in the town of Gresham, and to post a notice of said election in three public places within the town of Gresham, all of said publication and posting to be not less than ten days prior to said election.

Adopted by the Common Council of the town of Gresham, this 22d day of August, 1911.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT

Of Paragraph 22 of Section 12 of Chapter 5 of the Charter of the Town of Gresham.

WATER BONDS

AN ACT

To amend paragraph 22 of section 12 of chapter 5 of the charter of the town of Gresham entitled "An act to incorporate the town of Gresham in the County of Multnomah, Oregon, and to provide a charter therefor, and to repeal all acts or parts of acts in conflict therewith," filed in the office of the Secretary of State, February 11th, 1905.

Be it enacted by the people of the Town of Gresham and be it ordained by the Common Council of the Town of Gresham:

Section 1. That paragraph 22 of section 12 of chapter 5 of the charter of the town of Gresham entitled "An act to incorporate the town of Gresham in the County of Multnomah, Oregon, and to provide a charter therefor, and to repeal all acts or parts of acts in conflict therewith," filed in the office of the Secretary of State, February 11th, 1905, and which said paragraph reads as follows:

Paragraph 22. To appropriate money for town expenditures and to provide for the payment of the debts of the town, and to borrow money on the faith of the town, or loan the credit thereof, or both, for municipal purposes; provided, that the indebtedness of the town shall not at any time exceed in the aggregate the sum of Twenty-Five Hundred (\$2500) Dollars, which indebtedness is hereby authorized, and the same hereby is amended by adding thereto the following paragraphs designated "A," "B" and "C."

(Paragraph "A"). The Common Council of the town of Gresham and its successors in office is hereby authorized in the name of and under the corporate seal of the said town of Gresham, and in addition to the indebtedness limited in paragraph 22 of section 12 of chapter 5 of the charter of the town of Gresham, to issue and dispose of bonds of the said town of Gresham to an amount not exceeding Twenty thousand (\$20,000) Dollars. Said bonds so authorized to be of the denomination of One Thousand (\$1,000) Dollars, as the Common Council may determine, and in such form as said Council shall select with interest coupons attached thereto. The said bonds shall be signed by the Mayor and countersigned by the Recorder of the town of Gresham, and each of said coupons shall have the signatures of the Mayor and Recorder of the town of Gresham engraved thereon, whereby the town of Gresham shall be held and considered in substance and effect to undertake and promise, in consideration of the premises, to pay to the bearer of each of said bonds at the expiration of Twenty years from the date thereof, the sum named therein in gold coin of the United States, together with interest thereon in like gold coin at the rate of Six (6) per cent. per annum, payable half yearly as provided in said coupons. The bonds issued in pursuance of the authority hereby granted, shall be known as Water Bonds of the town of Gresham, Oregon, series 1909. The bonds herein provided for shall be advertised and sold to the highest responsible bidder, and the Council may at its discretion reject any and all bids tendered for such bonds, and proceed to readvertise the same when the bids are not satisfactory. All money derived from the sale of said bonds shall be in the care and

custody of the Treasurer of the town of Gresham, and credited to the water fund, and shall be paid out by him from said fund on warrants of the Mayor, attested by the Recorder of the town of Gresham, and not otherwise. The said bonds and interest are to be paid from taxes to be assessed, levied and collected upon all real and personal property in the town of Gresham not exempt from taxation.

(Paragraph B). All moneys acquired by the sale of the bonds herebefore provided, and credited to the water fund, shall be under the jurisdiction and control of the Common Council of the town of Gresham, and shall be expended by the said Common Council, first, for the expenses of the issuance of the bonds herein provided, and thereafter for any and all expenses connected with the purchase or condemnation of any real property or water right necessary for the carrying out of the establishment of water works for the town of Gresham. And the said Council is hereby authorized to use all moneys secured from the sale of said bonds, and in the water fund of the town of Gresham, for the purpose of constructing, purchasing, keeping, conducting and maintaining water works, and all necessary plants and facilities of a character and capacity sufficient to furnish the town of Gresham, and the inhabitants thereof, as well as the places and people along or in the vicinity of the lines of pipes, conduits, or aqueducts constructed or used for such purpose, with an abundance of good wholesome, pure water for all uses and purposes necessary for the comfort, convenience and well being of the same, and to that end may acquire by purchase or otherwise, real and personal property within and without the limits of the town of Gresham, as in the judgment of the Common Council may be deemed necessary and convenient. And to enter into all necessary contracts to purchase all necessary material and supplies, and to employ and discharge agents, workmen, laborers and servants as it may deem necessary or convenient in the construction, extension, operation, conduct and management of water works for the town of Gresham. To lay and construct pipe lines, reservoirs, pumping stations, and to purchase or acquire rights of ways and easements for such pipe lines or reservoirs, and to secure by purchase or otherwise, any necessary water rights for the purposes of providing water as herebefore set forth. And to do all other things of every kind and nature that shall by said Council be deemed convenient or necessary for the purposes of establishing, maintaining, and conducting general water works for the town of Gresham, and supplying water therefor. The Common Council of the town of Gresham, and its successors in office to have full charge and control of said water works and water plant when completed, and to establish by ordinance or otherwise fees and charges to be collected from individuals, persons or corporations for the supply of water to said individuals, persons or corporations, and to establish all other reasonable rules for the governing and conducting of said water works and for the maintenance and operation of the same.

(Paragraph C). All acts or parts of acts in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.
