

CLOSING DAYS DRAW CROWDS

The fifth annual county fair given by the Grange Fair association goes into history as a success. There were some failures due to oversight and accident but in general everyone was well pleased.

The paid admissions at the fair have not been given out officially yet but estimates based upon unofficial statements place the attendance about as follows: First day 1500, second day 3000, fourth day 4000, and Sunday 2000.

Secretary Kardell said his report would be ready to present at the directors at their meeting next Monday afternoon. The receipts from all sources will probably total something over \$3500. Against this there are of course many items of expense all of which are not known at this early date.

The sentiment of the officers and directors seems to be one of satisfaction with the fair. The attendance was good and the people generally expressed themselves favorably toward the management. While the admission charged was higher, so much more was given for the money than formerly that there was little ground for complaint.

The directors are unanimous in their desire and purpose to begin at once to plan for a greater fair next year. They see clearly where decided improvements can be made and expect to spare no pains to make it as it should be the county fair. Efforts will be made to have the premium list ready much earlier and to build up certain departments which were weak.

A great deal of praise is due those who worked to make the fair a success, among these are especially the officers and superintendents. Secretary Kardell has been ably assisted by Mrs. Kardell and Mr. Peterson and has kept such close track of all financial affairs that he expects to be able to give a complete financial report next week.

Among the most attractive exhibits at the fair was that of Gill Bros. On the long tables upstairs was arranged over 300 varieties of dahlias from their seed farm near Montavilla. Gill Bros. are the largest growers of dahlias in the Northwest. They are originators of many choice varieties. Their display was very beautiful and called forth much praise.

On the table was a book in which visitors were requested to register and neat blanks were handed out for writing down one's favorite flowers, these to be used in the future for ordering.

All of this shows commendable enterprise, the kind that wins.

Chas. Merrill is making early preparations to leave in October for Bend where he is sent by the Packard Motor Car company to look after their autos and trucks in that locality. STRONG ADDRESS BY MISS ROBBINS

On Sunday evening, Miss Robbins used as her subject, "Foundations." After leading the thought of her audience to the great "sky-scraper" of the city, with its framework of steel resting deep on a foundation of solid rock, she compared its solidity and safety with that of the bamboo house of the Philippines, built upon the sand and often wrecked by three fierce typhoons which sweep at times over our new possessions. The hearers were given a vivid picture of one of the bamboo field hospitals used by our government during the late war in the Islands.

Applying her illustrations, the speaker pictured the human body as a house; built either upon a rock, to stand the storms and stress of life, or upon the sand, to fall when assailed by the gales of temptation. Parents were pointed to the need of laying, by precept and example, such a foundation of character and principle in the young lives entrusted to them, as should be a safe-guard to the young man or young woman in after years.

In very impressive words, Miss Robbins told of one of her first temperance lessons. While in training in a large hospital in St. Louis as nurse, an unknown woman was found in the streets, unconscious from the effects of drink. Without regaining consciousness, to the surprise of all, she died. An autopsy was held at which the young nurses were permitted to be present. The brain of the unfortunate woman was seen, great surgeon, "this is due to alcohol." The heart was found to be inclosed in great layers of fat a sudden contraction of which had caused the sudden death, and again the words were heard, "caused by alcohol." The liver was exposed to view literally burned through and through with the deadly alcohol, and every organ of the body was found to bear the marks of abuse from alcoholic drinks. "What," said the speaker, will such a one give as an excuse, to God, for such treatment of that body entrusted to her?
