### ORDINANCE NO. 57.

AN ORDINANCE giving and granting to Mount Hood Railway and Power Company, its successors and assigns, a right and franchise to use certain streets of the Town of Gresham, Multnomah county, Oregon, at designated points, for the purpose of constructing, building, completing, operating and running railway lines, Telephone, Telegraph and Power Transmission Lines, over, upon, under and across the same.

Be it ordained by the Common council of the Town of Gresham.

Section 1. That Mount Hood Railway and Power Company, a corporation incorporated, organized and existing under the laws of the state of Oregon, and having its principal office in the City of Portland, Oregon, its successors and assigns, be and they are hereby given and granted the right and privilege for itself, successors and assigns, and its servants, agents and licensees, at all

times to freely pass and repass on, to build, construct, complete, erect, maintain, operate and run railway lines, telegraph, telephone and power transmission lines, over, upon, under and across the following streets in the Town of Gresham, Multnomah County, Oregon, as immediately hereafter designated:

Division Street, just west of Main Street.  
 Main Street, just south of Division Street.  
 Roberts Avenue, between Division Street and Fifth Street.  
 Hood Avenue, between Division and Sixth Streets.  
 Sixth Street, between Hood Avenue and Jenoa Street.  
 Gedamke Street, between Division Street and Powell Valley road, and over, upon, under and across all streets which may from time to time be opened, dedicated or constructed, over, under or across the railway, telegraph, telephone and power transmission lines as now located.

Section 2. Whenever it shall become necessary in the building, constructing, operating or maintaining of said railway lines, or the construction or maintenance of said telephone, telegraph and power transmission lines, over, upon, under and across said streets and designated places, to dig into any manner interfere with any included within this right, the Mount Hood Railway and Power Company its successors and assigns shall without delay put said streets or streets in a good passable condition, and shall remove all sand, earth or other material by such building, constructing, operating, maintenance and operation.
