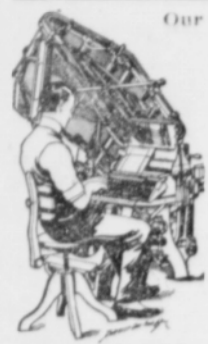

He says:
"I believe that every boy and girl should be taught to avoid liquor in any form as he would be taught to avoid poison in any form. The consumption of liquor, no matter in how small a quantity, when taken in the form of beer, wine, or whisky etc., is simply another form of slowly poisoning the body.

"I wish every boy in America would keep the pledge to refrain from intoxicating liquor of any kind or character as a beverage; to do all in his power to end the drink habit and the liquor traffic, and to abstain from the use of tobacco in any form.

"I have been in the Juvenile court ten years, and in that time I have had to deal with thousands and thousands of boys who have disgraced themselves and their parents, and who have brought sorrow and misery into their lives; and I do not know of any one habit that is more responsible for the troubles of these boys than the vile cigarette habit. No pure-minded, honest, manly, brave, gentle boy will smoke cigarettes."

ous Conservative leader becomes prime minister.

The most important feature to the country is the overwhelming defect of reciprocity. All Canada rallied to defeat this American movement. The great argument was that it would lead to the destruction of Canada and British unity; that annexation would be the next step. Lord Charles Beresford, who is in Canada, said that he believed that if reciprocity had carried it would have been the beginning of the end of the British Empire as a whole.

It is certain the American people wanted reciprocity. It is certain Canada didn't want it. The United States has learned a lesson. The matter will not be dropped but doubtless call forth new economic and political movements.

ORDINANCE NO. 58.

AN ORDINANCE granting to Mount Hood Railway and Power Company, its successors and assigns, for a period of twenty-five years, the right and privilege to erect, construct, maintain, and operate an electric light heat and power system in the Town of Gresham, Oregon, and the right and privilege to erect poles and stretch wires thereon and thereover, through, over and upon the streets, alleys and public highways, and to construct underground conduits or pipes, with all necessary manholes and other appliances in and under the said streets, alleys and public highways in the Town of Gresham, for conducting and conveying electricity for light, heat and power, to charge rents and tolls therefor and to collect the same and authorize the said Mount Hood Railway and Power Company to trim shade or ornamental trees in the said streets, alleys and public highways.

Be it ordained by the Common Council of the Town of Gresham.

Section 1. The Mount Hood Railway & Power Company, a corporation organized and existing under the laws of the State of Oregon, and having its principal office and place of business in the City of Portland, in the State of Oregon, and its successors and assigns, is hereby granted, subject to the considerations and conditions in this ordinance contained, the right and privilege to erect, construct and maintain an electric light, heat and power system in the Town of Gresham, Oregon, and the right and privilege to erect poles and stretch wires thereon and thereover, through, over and upon all of the streets, alleys and public highways and to construct underground conduits or pipes with all the necessary manholes and other appliances in and under said streets, alleys and public highways in the Town of Gresham, for conducting and conveying electricity for light, heat and power, and to charge and collect tolls therefor.

Section 2. All rights and privileges hereby granted shall expire at the end of twenty-five years from the date of the acceptance of the terms and conditions of this ordinance by the said Mount Hood Railway & Power Company, and in the event that the said Mount Hood Railway & Power Company shall fail, neglect or refuse to perform any of the obligations or requirements imposed by this ordinance, this grant and privilege may be terminated and annulled by the Council of the Town of Gresham and the said Mount Hood Railway & Power Company shall after such termination and annulment be deemed to have forfeited all right and privileges hereby granted.

Section 3. All necessary connections to subscribers' stations and to other points may be made by such wires and conductors and with such mains, apparatus and appliances as may be requisite. Said grantee, its successors or assigns, shall file with the town engineer or properly constituted authorities of the Town of Gresham, before doing any of the work under the authority of the franchise, plans of all conduits, manholes, distributing poles, and all other constructions proposed within the limits of the streets, alleys and public highways of the town, and in such form and detail including appropriate maps as the town engineer or other properly constituted authorities may reasonably determine and

approve, and plans and specifications of re-locations and changes shall be filed in like form and be approved before the same shall be made or work begun thereon; and the said grantee, its successors or assigns, shall not remove its poles after once being set, from any location to another, unless permitted to do so by the Town of Gresham, or its properly constituted authorities.

Section 4. The said grantee, its successors or assigns, under the direction of the Town of Gresham, or its properly constituted authorities, may make all necessary excavations in any street, alley or public highway, for the purpose of erecting, constructing and maintaining poles and other supports for its wires, conductors, light or arc lights, and for repairing the same, and for laying, repairing, and maintaining its underground conduits and pipes, and for the laying, repairing, maintaining and operation of its wires and other conductors thereon; all poles of the said grantee, its successors or assigns, shall be erected at the edge of the sidewalk, unless otherwise directed by the proper town authorities.

The Town of Gresham, by its properly constituted authorities, shall have the right to cause said grantee, its successors or assigns, to move the location of any pole or arc light whenever the removal thereof shall be deemed for the public convenience, and the expense thereof shall be paid by the grantee, its successors or assigns.

Section 5. When any excavation shall be made pursuant to the provisions of this ordinance, the said grantee, its successors or assigns, shall restore the portion of the street, alley or public highway to the same condition in which it was prior to the opening thereof, and all work shall be done in strict compliance with the rules, regulations and ordinances which may be adopted from time to time during the continuance of this franchise, by the Council of the Town of Gresham, or as may be otherwise provided by law.

It is further provided that the town authorities may require that any opening in any hard surface pavement in any street, alley or public highway, shall be filled in and the pavement replaced by the town authorities, and the cost thereof shall be paid by the said grantee, its successors or assigns, and the town authorities may require a deposit with the town treasurer of a sum of money sufficient to pay said cost by the said grantee, its successors or assigns before the opening of said street, alley or public highway shall be begun.

Section 6. The said grantee, its successors or assigns, are hereby empowered and authorized to cut and trim any and all shade or ornamental trees in any of the streets, alleys or public highways of the town of Gresham that interfere with any light, pole or wire, appliance or apparatus either in connection with, or as a part of the electric light, heat, power works, or system, or with the proper operation of its railway, telephone, telegraph and power transmission lines, but no such shade tree or ornamental tree shall be so cut or trimmed to a point below twenty feet above the sidewalk grade, nor shall any such shade tree or ornamental tree be cut or trimmed until the grantee, its successors or assigns, shall give written or printed notice to the owner or occupant of the premises in front of which the trees are growing, to trim such tree or trees, within one week after giving notice, at the cost and expense of the said owner or occupant. If said owner or occupant fails, neglects or refuses to so cut and trim such trees as required by said notice, the said grantee, its successors or assigns, may cut or trim, or cause to be trimmed, such trees at the expense of the said grantee, its successors or assigns.

Section 7. Nothing in this ordinance shall be construed as to in anywise prevent the Town of Gresham from sewerage, grading, paving, planking, repairing, altering, or doing any work that may be desirable on any of the streets, alleys or public highways, but all such work shall be done, if possible, in such a manner as not to injure or prevent the free use and operation of the said electric light, power and heat system, and the proper and free use and operation of said railway, telephone, telegraph and power transmission lines of said grantee, its successors or assigns.

Section 8. Whenever it shall be necessary in grading or sewerage, or in making any other improvements in any street or alley or public highway, to remove any pole or poles belonging to the said grantee, its successors or assigns, on which any line, or lines, wire or wires of said grantee, its successors or assigns, shall be stretched or fastened, the said grantee, its successors or assigns shall, upon ten days' notice from the Town of Gresham, or its properly constituted authorities, remove such pole or poles, and if failing, neglecting or refusing so to do,

the said Town of Gresham, by its properly constituted authorities, may remove the same at the expense of the said grantee, its successors or assigns.

Section 9. The said grantee, its successors or assigns, hereby agrees and covenants to indemnify and save harmless the Town of Gresham and the officers thereof, against all damages, costs and expenses whatsoever, to which it or they may be subjected, in consequence of the acts or neglect of the said grantee, its successors or assigns, in any manner arising from the right and privileges hereby granted.

This franchise shall not be construed as any limitation upon the Town of Gresham, through its proper officers, to grant rights, privileges or authorities to other persons or corporations similar to, or different from those herein set forth, in the same streets, alleys or public highways.

Section 10. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons unless authorized by the grantee, its successors or assigns, or by the Town of Gresham, by its properly constituted authorities, to interfere with, meddle with, injure or remove any of the poles, wires or underground conduits or pipes, or any insulator, instrument, light or apparatus, used in or as a part of the electric light, heat or power system herein provided for, and any person or persons violating any of the provisions of this section, shall, upon conviction thereof before the municipal court of the said Town of Gresham, be punished by a fine of not less than Ten (\$10.00) dollars or more than Fifty (\$50.00) Dollars or by imprisonment in the city jail not less than five or more than twenty-five days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Section 11. The rights, privileges and franchises granted by this ordinance are granted upon the conditions herein contained, and upon the following considerations to-wit:

First: The said grantee, its successors or assigns, shall, within thirty days after this ordinance shall be in force, file in the office of the recorder of the Town of Gresham, its written acceptance of this ordinance, granted to, and conferred upon said grantee, its successors and assigns, subject to all the terms, obligations, restrictions and provisions in this ordinance contained, and upon the expiration of thirty days' time allowed for acceptance of this ordinance, the same not hav-

ing been accepted unconditionally, this ordinance shall become wholly void, inoperative and of no effect.

Second: The said grantee, its successors or assigns hereby consents and agrees to perform and abide by all the terms, requirements and conditions required or imposed by any provisions of the Town Charter, upon the granting of franchises, rights and privilege, whether recited in this ordinance or not.

Third: The said grantee, its successors or assigns shall, during the life of this franchise, as a consideration for franchises granted this company, provide suitable lights, and properly light the streets over and across which the railway of the grantee herein runs at the place of crossing, with the understanding that from time to time if any new streets in said Town of Gresham are opened up for traffic, which said new street intersect the railway lines of the said grantee herein, or its successors or assigns, the place of crossing said new streets shall be lighted in the same manner.

Fourth: That the maximum rate to be charged within the corporate limits of the Town of Gresham for service by the said grantee, its successors or assigns, shall be as follows:

2500 to 4000 or less per month.	3c
4000 to 6000 or less per month.	2 1/2c
6000 to 8000 or less per month.	2c
8000 to 10000 or less per month.	1 1/2c

FOR LIGHT AND HEAT

Twelve (12c) cents per kilowatt hour.
And it is agreed that the grantee, its successors or assigns, shall furnish to the Town of Gresham, upon request of the Town Council, such electric energy for the lighting of said Town as may be required, at its sub-station to be established therein at the rate of Two Cents (2c) per K. W. Hour.
