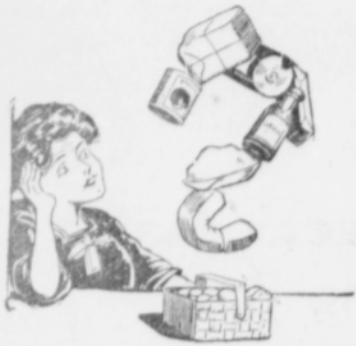

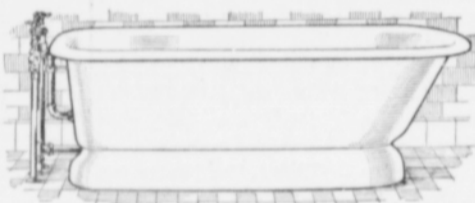

## APPEAL FOR HELP

Mayor Shattuck has received a communication from the mayor of Black River Falls, Wis., soliciting aid for that city and its citizens. The readers will recall that on October 6th a disastrous flood practically destroyed the city and brought great loss and suffering on its people.

It is nothing more than human kinship that should make us respond to this appeal. We that are strong ought to bear the infirmities of the weak. We are fortunate—others unfortunate. Let us help them. Let us do so at once.

The mayor and several councilmen have been interviewed on the subject and are practically agreed that the council can appropriate an amount equal to that contributed by our citizens. This within certain reasonable limits, of course. It is suggested that any amounts large or small, from 10 cents up, be handed to the cashier of the Bank of Gresham, during the next week or two and the council will probably add to the amount at its next regular meeting, November 7, and send it on to the mayor and council of Black River Falls.

### RESOLUTION.

Black River Falls, Wisconsin, October 11, 1911.

Resolved:—By the common council of the city of Black River Falls, Wis., that the mayor be and is hereby requested and empowered to make an appeal to the president of the United States, the governors of the different states in the union and the mayors of the different cities throughout the land for aid in money to our grief stricken city whose business portion and a large portion of the residence district has been wiped out by the flood on October 6th, 1911, and whose loss exceeds \$1,500,000.00.

Resolved further, that we request all contributions be sent by draft to the mayor and be deposited by him in the banks and disbursed on order of the common council.

We make the appeal for a deserving and needy people, trusting that the good people of our land will respond promptly and liberally to so worthy a cause, remembering that the Lord loveth a cheerful giver.

### BONDS FOR SALE.

Town of Gresham, \$20,000 Water Bonds.

Scaled proposals will be received by the undersigned until 8 o'clock p. m. on the twenty-third day of October, 1911, for the whole or any part of \$20,000 of the bonds of the Town of Gresham, in denomination of \$1000 each payable twenty years after date and bearing interest at the rate of six per cent per annum, payable half yearly, principal and interest payable in United States gold coin at the fiscal agency of the State of Oregon in the city of New York.

The above described bonds are issued for the following purpose, namely, the installation of a water system for the Town of Gresham.

The authority for the issue of said bonds is granted by an amendment to the charter of the town of Gresham, adopted September 18, 1911, by the voters of the Town of Gresham, and entitled, An act to amend paragraph 22 of section 12 of chapter 5 of the charter of the Town of Gresham, entitled, An act to incorporate the Town of Gresham in the county of Multnomah, Oregon, and to provide a charter therefor, and to repeal all acts or parts of acts in conflict herewith; filed in the office of the secretary of state February 11, 1905.

All the bidders will be required

to submit unconditional bids except as to the legality of the bonds, and such bid must be accompanied by a certified check on either of the banks of the Town of Gresham or on any responsible bank in the city of Portland, Oregon, for an amount equal to five per cent of the face value of the amount of bonds bid for; payable to the order of the mayor of the Town of Gresham, to be forfeited as liquidated damages in case the bidder shall withdraw his bid or shall fail or neglect to take and pay for said bonds, should said bonds be awarded to him.

The right to reject any and all bids is hereby reserved. All proposals should be marked, "Proposals for Water Bonds," and addressed to D. M. Roberts, recorder of the Town of Gresham.
