New Railroad Across Oregon will be Started at Once.

Announcement of a new railroad, across Oregon from east to west was appropriate news for Thanksgiving week. President Lovett of the Harriman system has authorized the construction of the Oregon Eastern from Vale to Dog Mountain, a distance of 140 miles. The road will not stop there but will be built to Burns, then presumably on to Bend and very likely south to connect with the Natron-Klamath line.

Work on the project will be rushed and it is expected to get the first link under way before the end of the present year. This new mileage will be of great value to eastern Oregon, a country now undergoing rapid development, and will give modern transportation to a district now isolated.
