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Ayrshire Cow Had Tuberculosis.

An Ayrshire cow from the herd at the Oregon Agricultural College was sacrificed to science last week, being used in a post mortem examination before the students. She had reacted from the tuberculin test some time ago, but because of her phenomenal yield had been retained, in quarantine under the Bang system, in the hope that she might produce a valuable calf. When the calf proved to be sickly, it was decided that the cow was no longer useful except for demonstration. Dr. W. S. McAllister, a Corvallis veterinarian and Prof. E. L. Potter, with G. R. Sampson, showed the students the effects of the tuberculin bacillus on the various tissues and organs.
