Nelson, manager of the Cherry Park orchards, has been increasing the area of the orchards the past month, by an added planting of a little more than thirty-five acres, making the total of orchards 125 acres. Hitherto these orchards have been planted one-half to cherries, one-fourth to apples, and one-fourth to pears. But in the past month only apples and cherries have been used. The cherries just planted are all Lamberts, the apples, Wagners and Arkansas Blacks. The cherries occupy three-fourths and the apples one-fourth.

There are now 70 acres of two year old trees, 20 acres of yearlings and the 35 acres of recent setting. About fifteen acres more of orchard will complete the planting.

Cherry Park adjoins Multnomah Farm, the new county farm, on the west. On the east consists of 140 acres. Adjoining this is Mr. Nelson's farm, which is registered as "Hope Gardens." The orchards have flourished well this year under continuous clean cultivation.
