Counting Arizona and New Mexico, newly admitted states, there will be 531 votes in the electoral college which will elect the President of the United States in 1912. The following states will very likely be democratic: Alabama 12, Arkansas 9, Florida 6, Georgia 14, Kentucky 13, Louisiana 10, Maryland 8, Mississippi 10, Missouri 18, North Carolina 12, Oklahoma 10, South Carolina 9, Tennessee 12, Texas 20, Virginia 12, Total 175. Among the doubtful states, but which are considered as having a democratic leaning, are Colorado 6, Arizona 3, New Mexico 3. Total 12. Some of the other states have a democratic leaning but it is hard to make out the 266 electoral votes necessary to a choice for that party.
