A permanent organization that will have considerable influence on Oregon affairs is promised through the formation of the Oregon Irrigation Congress, which has been called for February 19, 20 and 21 in the convention hall of the Portland Commercial club. All interested in irrigation are urged to attend and suggestions will be welcomed. The purpose of the congress is to have an effective organization to deal with irrigation questions and to secure the rights Oregon feels itself entitled to from the Federal government.

Indications are that there will be a big attendance from all parts of the state. Government officials and irrigation experts from all parts of the state will be invited and the proposed organization promises to be very useful to Oregon in the work of future development.

### SPECIAL ELECTION.

Notice is hereby given to the qualified electors of the Town of Gresham, Oregon, and to the qualified electors of the territory herein proposed to be included within the corporate limits of the Town of Gresham, that a special election will be held in the Town of Gresham on Saturday, the 10th day of February, 1912, for the purpose of determining whether or not the corporate limits of the Town of Gresham shall be extended to include the following described territory:

Beginning at a point where the north line of the City limits of the Town of Gresham intersects the east line of Main street; thence east one hundred feet, thence south to the Section Line between sections three (3) and ten (10) thence east to a point in the center of the Section Line road on the east line of the James Powell Donation Land Claim; thence continuing east along the center of the Section Line road 487 feet; thence due south to a point in the center of the Powell Valley road; thence east along the center of said road 260 feet; thence due south to a point 5 feet south of a line parallel to the south line of the present city limits; thence west to a point 5 feet south of the southern extremity of the east line of Juniper Avenue; thence south to the center of the Damascus road; thence south 65 degrees west to a point in the south line of A. Dowsett's 24 acre tract; thence in a northwesterly direction to the southwest corner of the Dammier tract; thence in a northerly direction following the east boundary of Henry Metzger's land to a point within 5 feet of the City limits; thence west 5400 feet; thence north to a point 300 feet due north of the north line of the Powell Valley road; thence east to the easterly line of County road No. 40; thence north to the intersection of the north line of the G. W. Sleret tract with said county road No. 40; thence east following the line between the Sleret tract and N. L.
