Experiments with Livestock.

Experiments in feeding 100 range lambs, half of them indoors and the other half out in the rain, are being conducted on the new stock farm purchased last summer by the Oregon Agricultural College. There is also a nice flock of Shropshires headed by a prize ram from the Cleveland flock, and a small flock of Cotswolds. The feeding experiments with a herd of swine are also progressing.

Five Belgian stallions, the finest that Dr. James Withycombe of the experiment station has ever seen together in Oregon, have just arrived at the college, having been loaned for the demonstrations in horse judging in the short course by Edson & Brown of Carlton. The Southern Pacific gave them free transportation to the college, on account of the educational work which they will be used for.
