Hood River Men Here

W. J. Davidson and S. W. Heppner, Hood River orchard men, were callers on C. S. Smith and J. A. Davidson here Saturday. Mr. Heppner is an orchardist and nurseryman of wide experience and is investigating the conditions here with reference to fruit growing. He thinks this as favorable a locality for orchards as the Hood River country. He recommends the following varieties of apples for this section: Delicious, Bananas, Ortleys, and Rome Beauty. Farther back toward the mountains he thinks the Newtowns, Jonathans and Spitzenbergs are better varieties. He urges the growing of pears and cherries here. Mr. Heppner brought a few samples of apple trees, one year old, which he left at the Bank of Gresham. They are exceptionally large fine trees.

SPECIAL ELECTION.

Notice is hereby given to the qualified electors of the Town of Gresham, Oregon, and to the qualified electors of the territory herein proposed to be included within the corporate limits of the Town of Gresham, that a special election will be held in the Town of Gresham on Saturday, the 10th day of February, 1912, for the purpose of determining whether or not the corporate limits of the Town of Gresham shall be extended to include the following described territory:

Beginning at a point where the north line of the City limits of the Town of Gresham intersects the east line of Main street; thence east one hundred feet, thence south to the Section Line between sections three (3) and ten (10) thence east to a point in the center of the Section Line road on the east line of the James Powell Donation Land Claim; thence continuing east along the center of the Section Line road 487 feet; thence due south to a point in the center of the Powell Valley road; thence east along the center of said road 260 feet; thence due south to a point 5 feet south of a line parallel to the south line of the present city limits; thence west to a point 5 feet south of the southern extremity of the east line of Juniper Avenue; thence south to the center of the Damascus road; thence south 65 degrees west to a point in the south line of A. Dowsett's 24 acre tract; thence in a northwesterly direction to the southwest corner of the Dammeler tract; thence in a northerly direction following the east boundary of Henry Metzger's land to a point within 5 feet of the City limits; thence west 5400 feet; thence north to a point 300 feet due north of the north line of the Powell Valley road; thence east to the easterly line of County road No. 40; thence north to the intersection of the north line of the G. W. Sleret tract with said county road No. 40; thence east following the line between the Sleret tract and N. L. Smith to a point within 500 feet of the City limits; thence north to a point due west of the northwest corner of the present City limits; thence east to the City limits.

The polls will open from 1 p. m. until 7 p. m. in the Town of Gresham, at the Town Hall. Geo. Leslie, W. H. Bond and S. S. Thompson have been appointed as judges of said election, and W. C. Burch and D. W. Metzger have been appointed as clerks of said election.

All qualified electors are hereby invited to vote on said question of annexation by placing upon the ballot the words "For Annexation" or "Against Annexation."
