This information came to the headquarters of the Pacific highway association in the brief telegram which states that Lawrence and Beaudette had been captured and held temporarily by the insurgents. They were finally released, and acting upon the instructions from the Examiner have given up the trip, and at the present time are trying to get out of the enemies country. The Sierra Madre mountains had been crossed and the capital of Mexico was almost in sight, the reaching of which would have been rewarded by the winning of the Pacific Highway association gold wheel. There is no question but what these pathfinders deserve almost as much credit as if they had actually gone to the city of Mexico. The fact that they did not was no fault of theirs, and the rest of the going was comparatively easy.

There is no question but what as soon as the internal strife of the Republic of Mexico settles that the people will turn to road building, and this trip although not completed will mark the beginning of a new era for highway construction by our southern neighbors. Undoubtedly fitting recognition of this pioneer work will be made by the Pacific Highway association at their annual convention at San Francisco, August 5th, 6th and 7th.

The chances are that the car has been captured by the insurgents, and that both men will be fortunate to get out of the country with their lives, not to say anything about their machine and their personal effects. However, it is generally believed that there is not much doubt but what both Lawrence and Beaudette will be able to return to the United States within the near future without any harm to themselves.
