

TRACK MEET HERE IN MAY

St. Johns and Gresham Divisions Will Compete in School Contests.

The meeting of the executive committee of the Multnomah county Athletic association was held last Saturday in the office of county Superintendent R. F. Robinson.

Superintendent Robinson has for some time been working on a plan for a literary and athletic contest to be open to every school in the county outside the city of Portland.

The schools of the county are divided into two sections, St. Johns and Gresham. The contests between these sections will be three-fold, consisting of Spelling, athletics and declamation.

The spelling contest will be held in the various schools in the county, under direction of the teachers, on Friday, April 26.

The declamation contest will be held at St. John's, Friday evening, May 17. In this contest there are three divisions according to grades and ages of the pupils.

The athletic contest will be held at Gresham, Saturday, May 25. This will be the most interesting of the exhibitions and will draw a record crowd to Gresham.

The athletic events are divided into five divisions, as follows:

- DIVISION A. For boys under 21 years. 100 yard dash. 220 yard run. 880 yard run. Running high jump. Pole vault.

- DIVISION B. For boys under 16 years. 100 yard dash. 220 yard run. 880 yard relay race for team of four.

- DIVISION C. For boys under 11 years. 100 yard dash. 50 yard dash. Running high jump. Throwing contest.

- DIVISION D. For girls under 21. Throwing contest. 75 yard dash.

- DIVISION E. For girls under 11 years. Throwing contest. 50 yard dash. Pottery race.

In each division there will be a first, second and third prize.

There are some scholarship conditions. A contestant in the athletic section must be carrying full grade work in school and have a general average of 75 per cent, with a minimum mark in anyone subject of 60 per cent.

It has been arranged to have five prizes in the spelling contest and three in the declamation contest.

In all three contests points will be awarded for first, second and third place. The section—St. Johns or Gresham—receiving the highest number of points will be awarded a \$20 silver cup.

A good band will be in attendance all day at the contest at Gresham.

Principal G. R. Robinson has been appointed a committee to secure prizes for awards in the athletic contests.
