

W. H. EVANS TO THE FRONT

J. L. Hammersley, a partner of Mr. Carter, who recently withdrew from the contest in favor of Mr. Evans, said that in the interests of good government his partner had withdrawn. He spoke strongly in favor of Mr. Evans.

Mr. Evans was announced to speak on White Slavery. After some introductory remarks he related some of the incidents with which he had become familiar in connection with his office as United States District Attorney.

Mr. Evans is a clear interesting speaker. He urged clean morals law enforcement and good government. The audience seemed pleased with the man and his evident qualifications.
