Columbia View

The Columbia View schoolhouse District No. 7, has not been situated on a county road, and has long felt the inconvenience of its location. Various attempts have been made to have the road running from the Barker road to Burns corner on Rockwood road established as a county road, but without success. It has become necessary for the district to build a new schoolhouse this summer so the question arose as to when the new school building should be built, which caused opposition to the site being changed. Yet the building could not be erected on the present site because of the fact that said road, if granted by the county, would run through center of the acre of land donated years ago by Wm. Wilkes for school grounds. The tract of land from which this acre was given has since fallen into the hands of Mrs. Annie Wright, a daughter of Mr. Wilkes. She says if the county will grant the road she will exchange property with the district giving them an acre facing on the road and running back to the railroad on the north. A delegation of citizens called on the county court, laid their troubles before them and they were assured that if a petition was presented to them now they would order the road opened at once. Geo. Zimmerman is now looking after the petition and ere snow flies this long sought for road will be a county road graded and graveled with a new schoolhouse facing it and everybody pleased.

Rockwood
