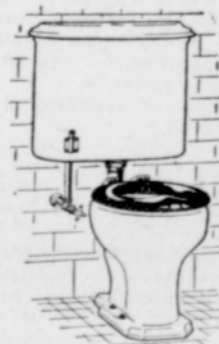
Waldemar Seton for Judge, 4

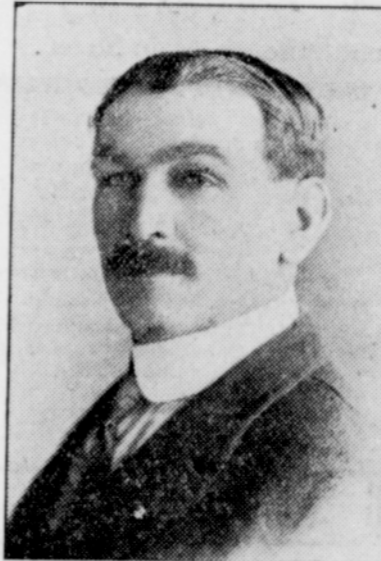
