SELLING MAN TO DEFEAT BOURNE

Prominent Attorney of Hillsboro Tells Why He Favors Selling.

Attorney W. G. Hare, of Hillsboro, recently wrote a letter to Ben Selling telling why he favored Selling's nomination. He says: "Like a great many others, I did not reply to your communication for the reason that I believed its purpose was to inspire my support. I did not, however, censure you in this respect, and considered it exceedingly good politics, being both beneficial and clean. "At the time mentioned, however, I had determined to support Judge Lowell, of Pendleton, whom I have personally met and in whose ability and integrity I have learned to have considerable confidence. I have now become convinced that

Lowell has absolutely no chance for nomination, and that the fight is between Senator Bourne and yourself.

"It has never been my policy to dictate letters to candidates for state office announcing my support, but, inasmuch as I am firmly convinced that Senator Bourne has misrepresented the state of Oregon altogether too long, that he stands in a class by himself within the state of Oregon as a political demagogue, I feel constrained to assure you of my heartfelt support. From my investigations of your record, I trust that the state will be honorably and ably represented if you are elected.

"Senator Bourne's positive statement in the primary pamphlet that he would not make any campaign, and that the people of Oregon were upon trial, followed by his campaign literature which has this day flooded our local mail, containing Kellerher' letter, the Port and Bay Commission letter, together with pamphlet containing 101 reasons why Bourne should be nominated, should be sufficient to cause any thinking citizen to inquire into the sincerity of a man who now claims to be the author of certain reforms which his conduct of ten years ago assisted in rendering necessary."

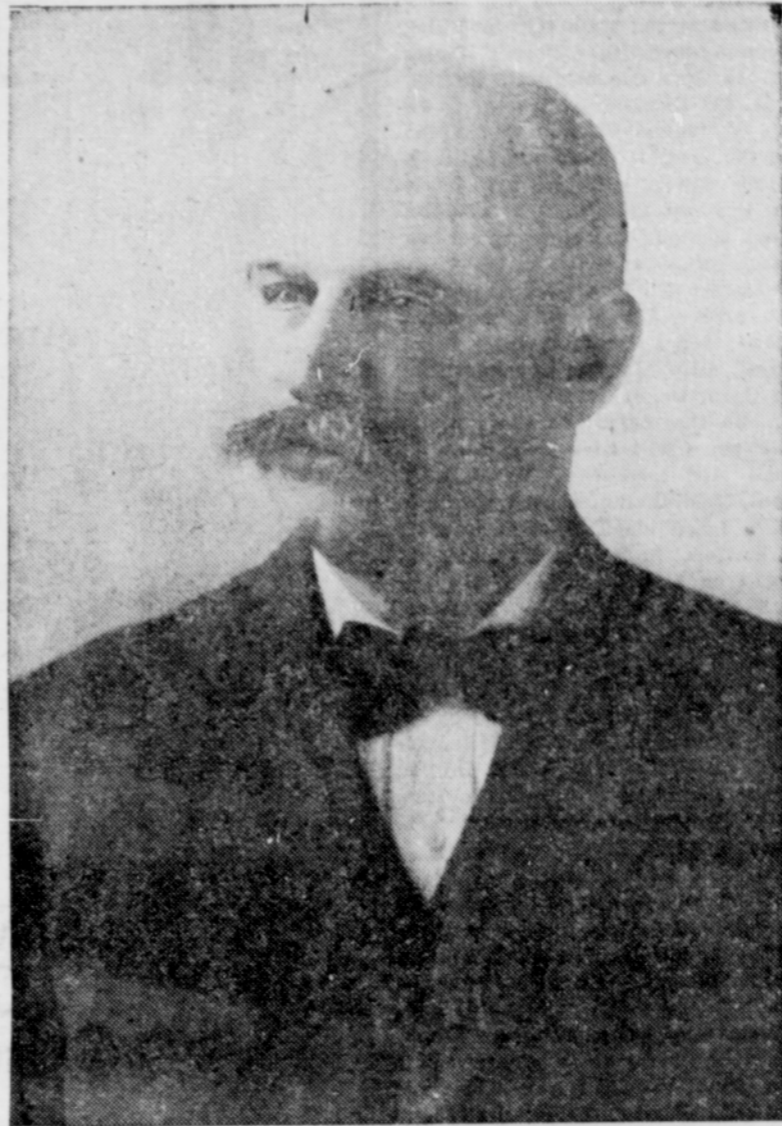

SOLVING LIVING COST PROBLEM

"Going down;" that is what is being done with the price of dainty luncheons at the domestic science department of the Oregon Agricultural college. What a demand there will be for the young lady students who are taking this course and accomplishing this result.

Beginning with the elaborate meal served Governor West a couple of weeks ago at a cost of 22 cents for each person, the girls have become more and more expert in economic buying and planning, until the luncheons have cost 15, 14, 13, and yesterday 10 cents a plate. It is a practical illustration of the way the domestic science department is finding solutions for the problem of the high cost of living.

The 10 cent luncheon, served by Miss Nell Sykes of Salem and Della Purves of Seattle, Wash., to a half dozen professors, had peach blossoms as decorations, and included in the menu baked beans, Boston brown bread, creamed potatoes en casserole, celery and lettuce salad, peach shortcake with whipped cream, and coffee.

At the same time the Misses Clare Pierce, LaGrande, and Emily Miller, McCoy, served a 13 cent luncheon with fern decorations to eight other professors. They did all of the cooking in the Soyer paper bags, to prove that black and greasy kettles and pans were unnecessary. The viands served were roast pork with apple rounds, baked potatoes, brown gravy, hot rolls, ginger Bavarian cream, coffee, wafers, and cheese.

Two 14 cent luncheons were served to other groups of faculty men last week. Miss Clara L. Hartsof, Lakeview, and Zoa Irwin, Corvallis, prepared one at which President Kerr and Senator Pierce of La Grande were guests of honor. They gave them mashed fruit cocktail, breaded veal cutlets and brown gravy, macaroni and cheese in ramekins, hot luncheon rolls, orange cream served in orange cups, and coffee, on a table decorated with blooming Oregon grape and lighted candles in crystal sconces.

White crocuses and lambs-tongues were used in decorating the table for the other 14-cent luncheon, at which there were six young instructors whose fare was mint lamb soufflé, creamed cauliflower, French fried potatoes, luncheon rolls, Bavarian cream in large melon moulds decorated with white trilliums, and sunshine cake.

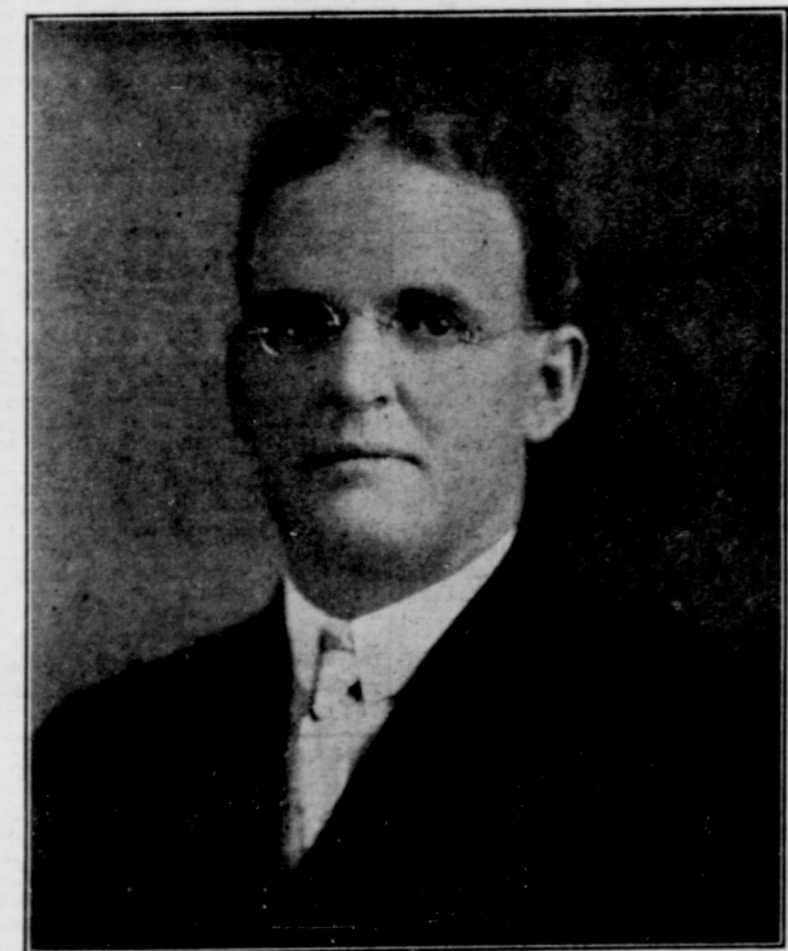
