Rosenkrantz Resided Here. Erastus Rosenkrantz, who met with such a tragic death, being burned to death in a fire which destroyed the Canby hotel last Saturday morning, was a resident of Troutdale for several years. He was a pioneer of 1849. He settled near Canby and except for a few years residence here has made his home there. He was 91 years of age, but still hale and hearty and was actively engaged in his work, the breeding and raising of fine horses, at the time of his death. He came into Canby Friday night on business and not being able to secure a room in the hotel where he usually stopped, went to the Canby hotel. He was warned of the fire when it broke out in the hotel early Saturday morning and seemed to have made an effort to escape. He threw out his clothes from the window in the second story, but instead of jumping as the others had done, disappeared into his room and was burned to death, nothing being left of his body but the skeleton.

It is thought by some that the old gentleman might have met with foul play. He was carrying \$80 on his person, and no trace of his money or the money belonging to the other hotel guests, amounting to several hundred dollars was found.

A divorced wife and eight children survive Mr. Rosenkrantz. Funeral services were held from the Methodist church at Troutdale last Sunday afternoon. Burial was in Douglass cemetery.
