THE LIBRARY SITE

It is being asked by many, What is the situation in regard to the library site? Just this, about fifteen hundred dollars have been subscribed, about twelve hundred dollars of which have been paid in at the banks to be held in trust for the purchase of the site on Main street. There remain about three hundred dollars more to be raised in order to take up the option given to the committee by Ed. Osborn. The original time of this option has expired, but Mr. Osborn has kindly extended it for a short time. It is necessary to raise this three hundred dollars and take up the option and it should be done at once. Some have not subscribed, some who subscribed, have not paid, although all subscriptions were due about March first. No citizen can afford to let this opportunity pass for providing an attractive and suitable home for the Gresham library. The question of location is a difficult one to adjust. It may or may not be possible to adjust it to suit everyone. The purchase of the present proposed location was undertaken in good faith by all interested. The thing to do is to buy this site and do it at once and show our good faith as individuals and as a community. It is a great public necessity and benefit to not a few but to everyone within a radius of many miles. It will look pretty small to hold off on the matter of purchasing a site. It is certain we cannot get the library until a site is provided.

Let the few who are holding back in making their subscription or paying same come forward and the situation will soon be what it should be. No one should wait in such a matter of public interest and benefit as this to be called upon but should volunteer their help and show praiseworthy public-spiritedness.

Consolidated Northwest Fruit Selling Agency.

Consolidation of the two movements to establish a general Northwest fruit selling agency at Portland has been effected. The Northwestern Fruit Exchange has changed its by-laws to provide for ultimate mutualization under control of the growers' unions which ship through the campaign. A committee representing the Portland Commercial club, Chamber of Commerce and Clearing House association has investigated the subject and recommends cooperation with the exchange on the part of the press, commercial organizations, banks and the fruit growers, based on the market value of the crop as fixed by the exchange.

Until two years ago the demand for Oregon and Washington apples was so heavy that buyers eagerly purchased crops on the trees. The increase in acreage is so enormous, however, that without a strong cooperative selling agency the entire prosperity of the fruit industry would be in danger. Last year, hundreds of carloads of apples, shipped by individuals and local associations, were sacrificed at auction in Eastern markets for little more than freight charges.

The prices secured for those districts marketing through the Northwestern Fruit Exchange were high and the growers received large and prompt returns. Co-operation with the exchange, as reorganized has been assured by the different commercial bodies and a vigorous campaign will be conducted to secure a heavy tonnage. The fruit districts represented at the Portland meeting were Rogue river, Mosier, Walla Walla, Yakima, Wenatchee, Cashmere, Spokane, Lewiston and Boise. A branch office of the exchange will be established at Spokane, but the operating headquarters will be built up at Portland.

Uniting these two movements means the salvation of the fruit industry by building up one strong selling agency.

Proposed Amendment of Section 12, of Chapter V, of the Charter of the Town of Gresham.

WATER BONDS.

An Act to amend section 12 of chapter V of the charter of the town of Gresham, entitled "An Act to incorporate the town of Gresham in the County of Multnomah, Oregon, and to provide a charter therefor and to repeal all acts or parts of acts in conflict therewith," filed in the office of the Secretary of State, February 11, 1905, as amended by the people of the town of Gresham at a special election held on the 18th day of September, 1911.

Be it enacted by the people of the Town of Gresham and be it ordained by the Common Council of the Town of Gresham.

Section 1. That section 12 of chapter V of the charter of the town of Gresham, entitled "An Act to incorporate the town of Gresham in the County of Multnomah, Oregon, and to provide a charter therefor, and to repeal all acts or parts of acts in conflict therewith," filed in the office of the Secretary of State, February 15, 1905, as amended by the voters of the town of Gresham, at a special election held on the 18th day of September, 1911, be, and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto the following paragraph to be known as paragraph 39.

30. The common council of the town of Gresham and its successors in office is hereby authorized and empowered in the name of the town of Gresham, in addition to the indebtedness limited in paragraph 22, section 12, chapter V, of the charter of the town of Gresham, and the further indebtedness of Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) of which the bonds authorized in the said paragraph are evidence, to issue and dispose of negotiable bonds of the town of Gresham to an amount not exceeding Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) of the denominations of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) to One Thousand Dollars (\$1000.00) in the manner and of such form as the council may determine, under the seal of the town of Gresham, with interest coupons attached thereto.

The said bonds shall be signed by the mayor and countersigned by the recorder of the town of Gresham, and each of the coupons shall have the signature of the mayor and recorder of the town of Gresham engraved thereon, whereby the town of Gresham shall be held and considered in substance and effect to undertake and promise to pay to the bearer of each of said bonds in consideration of the premises at the expiration of twenty (20) years from the date thereof the sum named therein in like gold coin of the United States, together with interest thereon in like gold coin at the rate of

six per cent (6 per cent) per annum, payable half yearly, as provided by said coupons, the bonds in pursuance of the authority hereby granted, shall be known as "Water Bonds of the Town of Gresham, Oregon, Series 1912." The bonds herein provided for shall be advertised in the official newspaper of the town of Gresham and in one of the daily papers of the city of Portland, Oregon, for a period of one (1) week, the last publication to be at least ten (10) days before the time set for opening bids and sold to the highest responsible bidder, and the council may at its discretion reject any and all bids tendered for such bonds and proceed to re-advertise the same when the bids are not satisfactory. The money derived from the sale of said bonds shall be in the care and custody of the treasurer of the town of Gresham and credited to the water fund and shall be paid out by him from said fund on warrants of the mayor attested by the recorder of the town of Gresham, and not otherwise.

The bonds hereby authorized shall be a general obligation of the town of Gresham, payable out of the general funds of said town and the common council is hereby authorized to include in its annual tax levy a special levy sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and to provide a sinking fund for their retirement when due and for the purposes aforesaid. The common council of the town of Gresham shall have power and authority to enter into the necessary contracts and purchase the necessary materials and supplies and employ and discharge agents, workmen, laborers and servants, as it may deem necessary and convenient, in the conduct, extension, operation and management of the water system and to do any further act in the construction, operation, management or extension of the water system of the town of Gresham that it may deem necessary or advantageous to said town, including the furnishing of a supply of water to any person or persons or to any territory outside of the town of Gresham. The common council is hereby authorized to acquire the necessary land, rights of way or other property by condemnation proceedings or otherwise, and to institute in the circuit court of Multnomah County, Oregon, such condemnation suits as may be necessary and the proceedings therein shall be the same as is provided by the general laws of the State of Oregon for the condemnation of land by railroad companies.

All acts or parts of acts in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

BALLOT TITLE.

Shall the charter of the town of Gresham, Section 12, Chapter V, be amended in such a manner as to give the council power to issue negotiable bonds in an amount not to exceed \$5000.00, for the purpose of making extensions to the water system of the town of Gresham, and to enter into contracts of employment, purchase materials, and condemn land, for the purpose aforesaid?
