A. F. Miller, of Sellwood, has been appointed by the county court to collect the products for the permanent exhibit of the county, for which \$350 has been appropriated.

Extensive displays of state products will undoubtedly be arranged at Portland during the Rose Festival, Elks convention and other gatherings of the coming summer.

Statistics have been gathered by World's Work relative to the cost of living in various countries. These point with more or less certainty to the conclusion that although in the past fifteen years the rise in the cost of living abroad has been about thirteen per cent or a little more, the rise in the United States has been about forty per cent.

PORTLAND ROSE FESTIVAL PROGRAM

ROSE SUNDAY, JUNE 9.

TUESDAY, JUNE 11. 10 a. m.—Band concerts on principal decorated streets. 10:30.—Cruiser Boston tenders public reception. Anchorage foot of Stark street.

WEDNESDAY, JUNE 12. 10 a. m.—Musical symposium and serenades by the Rose City's famous bands. 12 m.—Awarding prizes for competitive exhibits at the Rose Show, Armory.

THURSDAY, JUNE 13. 10 a. m.—Rose City bands parading business centers of the city. 10.—Special day for ladies at the Rose Show, Armory.

FRIDAY, JUNE 14. 10 a. m.—City will play host to all visitors. Merchants will tender reception to out-of-town customers.

SATURDAY, JUNE 15. 10 a. m.—Band concerts at hotels and prominent thoroughfares. 10.—Observation cars will carry visitors to view 1000 beautiful rose gardens, lawns and terraces.

SUNDAY, JUNE 16. 10 a. m.—Grand finale. Brilliant and dazzling electrical pageant in honor of Rex Oregonus, who departs from this realm of revels with spirit du carnival in a blaze of glory.

It is conservatively estimated that the motion pictures of the Rose Festival will be seen by more than 100,000,000 people. Twenty important conventions,

MULTNOMAH COUNTY STOCK LAW

Section 1. It shall, after this act goes into effect, be unlawful for cattle, horses, mules, sheep, goats, or hogs to run at large in that part of Multnomah county, Oregon, which lies west of the Sandy river.

Sec. 2. Any animal enumerated in Section 1 of this act found running at large in Multnomah county, west of the Sandy river, may be taken up by any person, who shall thereupon immediately notify the owner thereof, if the owner be known; if such owner be unknown to the person so taking up such animals, he shall, within one day thereafter, post notices describing the animals, with reasonable certainty, and stating where such animals are kept.

Sec. 3. The owner or his agent, may retake possession of his animals from the person so taking them up at any time prior to the sale thereof, as hereinafter provided, by first tendering to such person his charges for so taking them, which shall be as follows: Fifty cents per day for each head of cattle, horses or mules; and twenty-five cents per day for each head of sheep, hogs or goats, to the person taking up the same for the time he has held it, and also the cost of publishing the notices in the newspaper, as in this act provided for.

Sec. 4. After the expiration of one day after notice to the owner, or his agent, in case of personal notice to such owner or agent, or at the expiration of five days next from and after the publication of notice in a newspaper, as provided in Section 2 of this act, the person so taking up said animal shall advertise the same for sale by publishing in the newspaper designated in said Section 2, a notice of sale, which shall contain the same description required to be given in the notices of taking up such animal, or animals, and shall state that on a day and hour named therein, which shall not be less than five nor more than ten days after the date of publication of said sale notice, he will, at the place where said animal or animals have been kept since taking up, sell the same at public auction, to the highest bidder, for cash in hand.

Sec. 5. The proceeds of said sales shall be applied to the payment of the charges of the person taking up said animals, as in this act provided, and the surplus, if any, shall be paid to the county clerk of the county in which the sale has been made, and shall be paid by order of the county court of said county to the owner of the animals so sold, upon due proof being made before said court.

Sec. 6. The person taking up animals, as provided in this act, may become a purchaser at said sale.

Sec. 7. All young animals, under six months old, when accompanied with their mother, are exempt from the operation of this act.

Sec. 8. No suit, action, or proceeding shall be maintained in any court to recover the possession of any animal taken up from the person so taking it up, under the provisions of this act, until the sum of money due under the provisions of this act has been tendered to the party or person taking up the same, nor shall any suit or action be maintained against the purchaser of such animals at said sale, or the heirs or assigns of such purchaser, until the full amount paid by such purchaser for such animal at said sale with interest thereon at the rate of ten per cent per annum from date of said sale, shall have been tendered to such purchaser, his heirs and assigns.
