YOUTHFUL MISCONDUCT

Gresham has always enjoyed the distinction of being a quiet, orderly place. There has in the past been little need of restricting ordinances and police surveillance. So little has there been for the marshal and police judge to do in this line that their methods like the jail hinges are a little rusty.

Occasionally, however, a drunk comes to the surface and is fined or some other transient violator falls into the gentle hands of the marshal and pays his respects to the police court. It is rare that young boys are called up charged with disorderly conduct. This however occurred last Sunday morning.

Complaint was made by citizens along Powell street that the peace was being disturbed. The marshal was called out about four o'clock and found on the street three young boys and as many young girls indulging, it is said, in unseemly words and actions and disorderly conduct generally. The boys all reside in town and some of the girls. They had evidently been carousing during the night. The marshal told the boys they were under arrest and sent all to their homes. They were required to appear before the recorder Monday morning and plead guilty, paying fines of from \$5 to \$10.

As they are young boys and girls, most of them connected with respectable homes in town, the Outlook withholds the names. The conduct of these young people, however, should be closely watched. It is an easy and swift road downward when one once gives the reins

to passion and joins hands with strong drink and careless women.

COMMENCEMENT AT O. A. C.

This week is commencement week at the Oregon Agricultural College, at Corvallis. Sunday the Baccalaureate sermon will be preached by Rev. J. H. Boyd of Portland. Monday, June 10, is Alumni day and Tuesday Commencement day. The exercises being at 10 a. m. The address will be by President David Starr Jordan of California.

ORDINANCE NO. 61.

An ordinance declaring certain assessments for the construction of sidewalks within the Town of Gresham.

Be it ordained by the common council of the Town of Gresham:

Section 1. That the following assessment be made upon the property benefitted by the construction of certain sidewalks within the city limits of the Town of Gresham, to-wit:

- The south end of lot ten (10) block (1) Metzger's Addition to Gresham.....\$19.00
- The north end of lot five (5) block (1) Metzger's Addition to Gresham.....\$19.00
- Present owner, Mrs. Ruby Chalker
- The east end of lot five (5) block six (6), Mt. Hood Addition to Gresham.....\$ 7.60
- The east end of lot eleven (11) block six (6), Mt. Hood Addition to Gresham.....\$19.00
- The east end of lot twelve (12) block six (6), Mt. Hood Addition to Gresham.....\$19.00
- The south side of lot twelve (12) block six (6), Mt. Hood Addition to Gresham.....\$48.64

Section 2. That said assessments as above set out, be docketed in the

lien book for the Town of Gresham as by Section 9 of chapter 7 of the charter of the Town of Gresham provided.

Section 3. That said work shall be let by contract to the lowest responsible bidder, said work to be done between the 20th day of May, 1912, and the 1st day of July, 1912, and that notice asking for bids on the said work be published for two (2) consecutive times in the official newspaper of the Town of Gresham, at least one (1) week before said bids are opened.

ORDINANCE NO. 62.

An ordinance amending Section 4 of Ordinance Number 6, entitled "An Ordinance Licensing and Regulating Saloons in the Town of Gresham."

Be it ordained by the common council of the Town of Gresham:

Section 1. That Section 4 of Ordinance numbered 6, entitled "An Ordinance Licensing and Regulating

Saloons in the Town of Gresham" adopted and approved July 11, 1904, is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 4. That if the application is duly presented and other requirements of the preceding section of this ordinance are duly complied with, then the council may, at its discretion, order a license to be granted; provided, however, that hereafter the number of licenses to be issued shall be limited in accordance with the governmental census as it is taken from time to time in such a manner that the proportion of licenses issued shall not exceed one (1) license to every five hundred (500) inhabitants in said town of Gresham. A license blank shall be issued to such applicant stating clearly the name of licensee, date of beginning and ending of time for which license is granted, and location of proposed place of business; such license shall be conspicuously posted and kept in plain view in said place of business.
