Fourth Annual Conference of the Washington Mission District.

Monday morning the business sessions opened with Rev. F. H. Freund president of the district, presiding. Ministers representing congregations from Washington, Oregon and Idaho were present with a delegate from each congregation. Important and vital subjects in regard to the work carried on in the district were discussed in all sessions. All reports read showed that the German Evangelical Synod of North America is making rapid progress in this section of the country. During the past year a number of new congregations were organized. The conference adjourned Wednesday, and agreed upon Payette, Idaho, as its next meeting place.
