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An experiment station for Coos county to aid fruit growers in the region west of the coast range of mountains is a project that has been set on foot. Climatic and soil conditions of the coast country are different from those prevailing in other parts of the state and it is felt that such a station would be of great benefit to fruit growers. Societies are being organized in different sections of Coos county to accomplish this result.

State Engineer Lewis characterizes the Deschutes river as the most wonderful stream in the world after a trip through its entire drainage basin. He says the possibilities for irrigation are tremendous and the future development of water power no less so. He estimates nearly 900,000 horsepower can be generated in this stream by 16 dam sites already located. An enormous increase can be made by harnessing tributary streams.
