Quite a party went from Gresham yesterday to attend the meeting of the Oregon Pioneers' association. Notwithstanding the heavy rain, an enthusiastic meeting was held. A little rain does not hurt an Oregon pioneer.

Among those going from Gresham were W. H. Bond, Mr. and Mrs. S. B. Johnson, Mr. and Mrs. John Roberts, Mr. and Mrs. Geo. Pullen and Mr. Pullen's brother Tom from Grass Valley, who has been visiting here for some time.

W. H. Bond who is a member of the Oregon Pioneers' association, was but a boy of 12 years when he came with his parents from Iowa in 1853. He says that he started on the long journey with two pair of new shoes, but they were worn out long before the journey was done. A pair of moccasins bought from the Indians were soon worn out, after which the boy protected his feet as best he could with rags, from the sage brush and prickly pears.

More School District Reports.
Reports have come in from a few more of the schools in this locality.

Kelso school, Dist. No. 19, Clackamas county has had a good year and expects to employ two teachers next year. At the recent election T. B. Milan was elected director for three years and P. C. Spooner was re-elected clerk. A 3 mill tax was voted for school maintenance.

Cottrell school, Dist. No. 167 Clackamas county chose Frank Beck director and Carl Shetterly clerk. A 7 mill tax was voted. Two teachers will be employed in this school next year.

In District 83 Joint, Hillsfield school, L. Yunker was re-elected director for three years and A. Forsythe was re-elected clerk. The school meeting passed off harmoniously.

In the Sandy school district, C. Junker succeeds P. P. Gray as director, and J. W. Howard succeeds C. Sharnke as clerk. The vote for a union high school stood 15 for and 10 against. All outlying districts voted down the proposition.

Buckley school, Dist. No. 29, has had a prosperous year. The enrollment for the year was 30, and the average attendance 25. The eighth grade will be taught next year. G. Wood is chairman of the board of directors. The other directors are P. S. Derlin and H. H. Johnson, Jr. Mr. Tuke is clerk.
