The Outlook is glad to note the advancement made by Miss Mary Wilson, a Gresham girl who graduated from the Gresham High school in 1907. Miss Wilson graduated this month from the domestic science and art department of the Oregon Agricultural College. She was president of her club and of the Adelphean literary society this year. She served the same society last year as vice-president, and was also active in the Margaret Snell club, composed of the students of home economics.

Bryan and Lincoln Extolled.

Ollie James of Kentucky, permanent chairman of the Baltimore convention in his acceptance speech extols both Bryan and Lincoln in almost the same breath. Of the former he says:

"However much we may differ in National conventions upon minor questions, all just men must admit that the one living American whose name will shine in history studded with a thousand flaming stars, along beside that of Jefferson and Jackson, is that of William Jennings Bryan of Nebraska."

Of Lincoln he says:
"The war is over and that flag, the brightest, dearest colors ever knit together in a banner of the free, waves above a united people, where it is loved by every heart and would be defended by every hand. And coming from the south as I do, I can say that if Abraham Lincoln were alive this day, there is not a foot of soil under Dixie's skies upon which he might not pitch his tent and pillow his head upon a confederate soldier's knee, and sleep, and sleep in safety there."

Headquarters have been opened at Portland for the World's Christian Citizenship Congress that will be held in late June and early July next year. Rev. J. S. McGaw, of Pittsburg, is in charge and he will organize a committee of 100 to manage details of the conference. It is proposed to bring to the convention many of the most prominent churchmen and leaders in reform movements of the whole world.

Portland will have a big apple show next winter. The time has been fixed tentatively as the last week in November. Business men of the Rose City are now working on the details. Good prizes will be offered and it is expected to make the affair a big success. It will be under the general direction of the State Horticultural Society and business interests and commercial bodies will co-operate fully.

For the first time in its history the famous battleship Oregon is to visit its own state. During the Elks reunion, in July, the historic old fighting ship will be brought to Portland harbor, where it will be much admired by all loyal Oregonians. Naval officials have at last given their consent to the request that the Oregon be brought here.

Portland People to View Central Oregon.

The most extensive "Seeing Oregon" trip ever undertaken from Portland will be the big excursion to Lakeview next August. Business men of the metropolis will go by automobiles, covering about 2,000 miles. Alternate routes will be taken going and coming, so that an immense area of the state will be covered.

At Lakeview the Central Oregon Development League will be in session August 20, 21 and 22, and the journey will cover ten days. Some will go by train to Bend, others by auto, and all will leave Bend and motor southward to Lakeview, following different routes. Returning, the Klamath country and Crater Lake will be visited and delegates from Portland will take the train at Bend for home.

SPECIAL ELECTION.

Notice is hereby given to the qualified electors of the Town of Gresham, Oregon, and to the qualified electors of the territory herein proposed to be included within the corporate limits of the Town of Gresham, that a special election will be held in the Town of Gresham, on Monday, the 15th day of July, 1912, for the purpose of determining whether or not the corporate limits of the Town of Gresham shall be extended to include the following described territory:

Beginning at the 1/4 section, corner on the north side of Sec. nine Township 1 South, Range 3 East, of Willamette Meridian; thence south 50 minutes west, tracing center line of county road to a point 300 feet north of the north line of the Powell Valley road, or to a point intersecting the line of the present Town limits; thence west 389.8 feet; thence north 50 minutes east, parallel with center of county road to a point in center of Section Line road; thence east, tracing center of Section Line road to place of beginning.

The polls will be open from 1 p. m. until 7 p. m., in the Town of Gresham, at the Town Hall. W. H. Bond, F. Cooley, and S. S. Thompson have been appointed as judges of election, and D. R. Shoemaker and D. W. Metzger, have been appointed as clerks of said election.

All qualified electors are hereby invited to vote on said question of annexation by placing upon the bal-

lot the words, "For Annexation" or "Against Annexation."

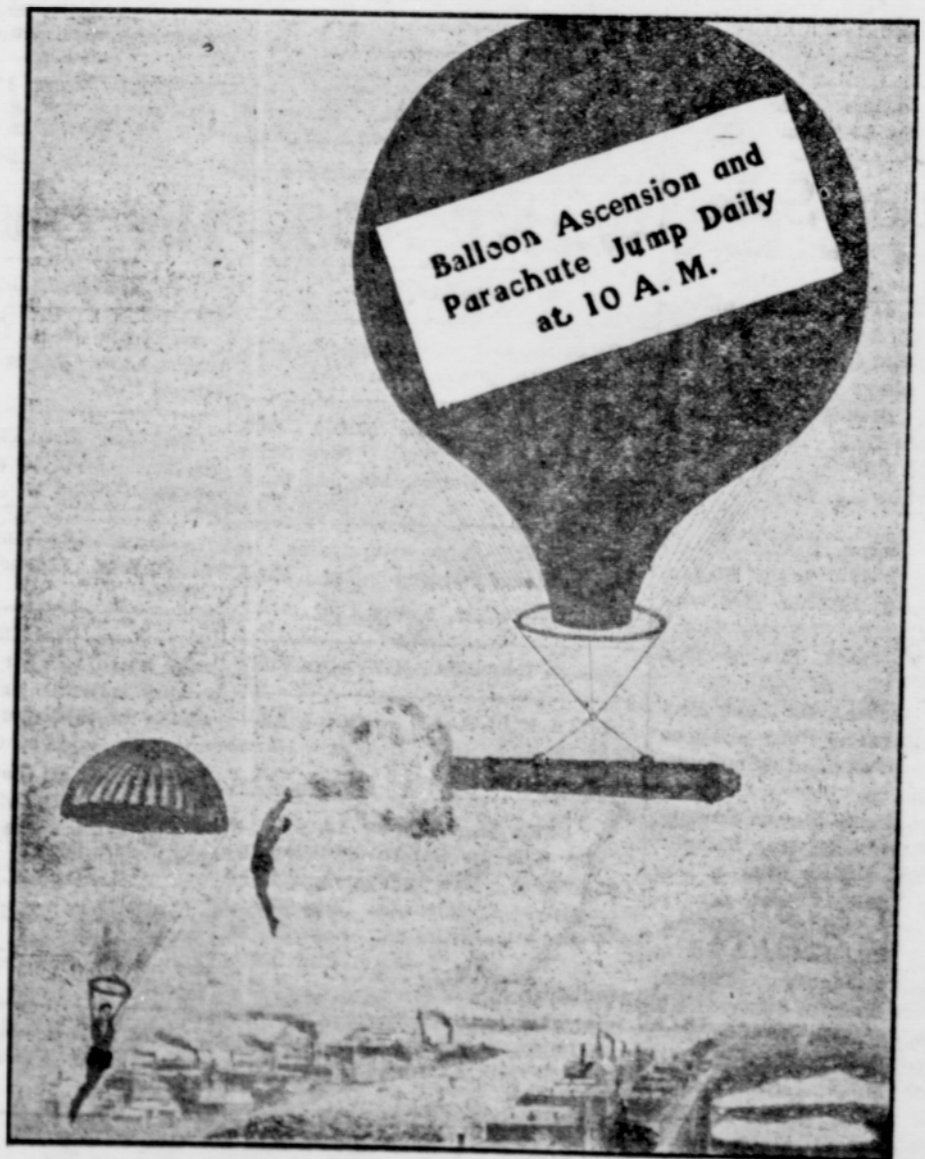
