

### BLONDER WILL HELP BOOST OREGON

Wm. Blonder, who was with the former Mt. Hood Railway and Power company, and recently with the Multnomah Central Railway has been appointed immigration agent for the Great Northern railway in the east and enters upon his new duties at once. He will first make a tour of the Willamette Valley to familiarize himself with the opportunities and resources of the state.

Mr. Blonder is well qualified for this position. He is an enthusiast for Oregon, is a linguist of experience, having been connected with the government and New York State Immigration bureaus and is thoroughly familiar with immigration and colonization movements.

It is the plan of E. C. Leedy, general immigration agent of the Great Northern Railway, to greatly enlarge the scope of his department and make extensive exhibits of Oregon products in the East.

As Mr. Blonder has many friends here and is very familiar with this section of the state, it may be hoped he will not forget us when he recommends "the best part" of Oregon.

The American athletes are making a good record at Stockholm. They have won first place in expert rifle shot and in certain of the races. The remaining events of the week will include all of the principal athletic features in which the Americans will take part. Saturday will see the finals in the standing high jump, the discus throw, the 400 meter and team race. On the following day will take place the great Marathon race, in which America hopes to repeat her victory, achieved at London two years ago.

Two prize fights of much interest to the sporting fraternity were pulled off on July 4. One at Las Vegas, N. M., between Jack Johnson and Jim Flynn, in which the negro was declared victor in the ninth round; the other at Los Angeles, where Ad Wolgast defeated Joe Rivers in the thirteenth round.

Judge John Denney, who introduced the China pheasant in Oregon, died at his home in Albany, day. He was a well known man, a thorough Oregonian, a soldier in the civil war, and a respected public citizen.

The Mt. Hood automobile road is reported to be in excellent condition to Welch's Hotel and Rhododendron Tavern, except a short sketch on the lower portion near Cherryville, where the road has not dried out. Several automobiles made the run to these resorts July 4 and reached those places in three or four hours' time, which indicates that the road is in good condition. Joseph Kistler made the run to Welch's Hotel in a little over three hours and returned in about the same time. The road to Government Camp from the Toll Gate also has been improved and is now open.—Daily Oregonian.
