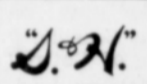

Death of O. Benson

Mr. O. Benson died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. A. G. Horberg, July 21, 1912. The funeral was from the Baptist church at Haley, July 23, under the direction of R. R. Carlson of Gresham.

Mr. Benson was born in Sweden, October 14, 1845. He was married to Miss Johanna Anderson in 1871. In 1882 he emigrated to America and settled at Huron, S. D. From there he moved to Portland, Ore., in 1901, where he lived until after his wife's death December 13, 1908. Since then he made his home with his daughter, Mrs. A. G. Horberg, near Boring. He passed away July 21, 1912, at 6:30 a. m., after much suffering from cancer of the stomach.

Mr. Benson is survived by six children and their families. He was a kind husband and father. He was a member of the First Swedish Baptist church of Portland. Rev. F. Linden of Portland, assisted by Rev. J. Johnson preached the funeral sermon. There were many beautiful flowers to show the sympathy of friends and neighbors.
