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ORIGIN OF "BULL MOOSE."

Many of our readers are wondering what is the origin and significance of the expression, "Bull Moose," as applied in caricature to Theodore Roosevelt and the new party which is in process of formation. It seems that when in Chicago under the pressure of the republican repudiation and the determination to "bolt," Roosevelt exclaimed that he felt like a bull moose. The expression was immediately taken up by the newspapers of the country which in cartoon and satire have belittled the new party movement and its originator.

The suggestion was probably all unconscious on Roosevelt's part but it has added a new animal to the political menagerie and given the reporters a chance that they have not been slow to take advantage of. Some one has even gone so far as to trace the points of analogy between this new political rival and his prototype. Suffice it to say that the analogy was not made to appear very favorable to the colonel.

AUTO SPEEDING.

Some Gresham automobile owners have received a taste of the drastic means taken by Municipal Judge Tazwell, of Portland, to stop reckless automobile driving in Portland.

W. R. Biddle was fined \$10 for turning a corner to the left and M. O. Nelson was arrested for speeding.

Both arrests were made Friday. These men are neither of them reckless drivers and probably did not think they were breaking the law. Just a little careless, probably. It comes pretty hard on the one who is pulled especially when 59 others do the same thing and are unmolested.

We suggest that the city of Gresham pass a drastic ordinance and get even on some of the Portland speeders who go through town at about 30 miles an hour.

FISH HATCHERIES.

The House committee on Merchant Marine and Fisheries has reported favorably an omnibus appropriation bill for additional fish hatching and fish culture stations in the various states of the United States. Twelve states receive appropriations under the bill, Oregon being the most favored on the list. Eleven of the states get \$25,000 each for the establishment of one station while Oregon gets \$50,000 for the establishment of two stations. Congressman Lafferty appeared before the committee in behalf of Oregon and made an argu-

ment in favor of two stations, submitting a letter from the department of Commerce and Labor to Senator Bourne reciting that the salmon output of the Columbia river can be doubled in four years by proper management. Lafferty also submitted telegrams from Secretary of State Olcott showing that the state of Oregon has recently appropriated \$70,000 of state money to promote fish hatcheries in Oregon.

THE "BLUE-SKY" LAW.

At the coming election we are to vote on the "Blue-Sky" law for Oregon. It comes up by way of the referendum. The law as at present drawn up is said to contain some provisions which are not considered wise and good although there is no question about the need of the law. It is advocated by some that the present law should be voted down and the legislature called upon to pass the law with some of its side issues eliminated.

For instance the law calls for the appointment of a special commission to carry out its provisions. This is said to be an unnecessary expense, there being already officers who could do the work required in connection with this law.

The purpose of the law is to make it compulsory for all corporations doing business in the state to file with the secretary of state a complete statement of their condition. This is necessary before they can offer a single share of stock for sale.

It is now proposed that a national law of this kind be enacted. This would be very desirable, as it would eliminate the use of the mails by unsafe and unscrupulous investment companies.

"Nothing save a safe and stringent national 'blue-sky' will be effective to forever close the mails against the sale of fake and wildcat securities," says the Financial World.

"It is true that the postal laws close the mails to swindles, but this can be done only after these swindles have been perpetrated and complaints lodged with the postal authorities in Washington. These postal laws are not preventive, they are only primitive. If we had a national law making it obligatory on companies to file sworn statements of assets, earnings, capitalization, etc., with the postoffice department or a separate government bureau, and forbidding at the same time sales of securities without permission from such department of the government, the get-rich-quick man could be wiped out in less than no time, and if he nevertheless persisted in resuming business, he would have then to take the consequences * * * The investments of the masses will then flow into legitimate channels instead of enriching a vast army of confidence men."

Prohibition Platform

Eugene W. Chafin of Arizona, and Aaron S. Watkins of Ohio are the candidates for President and Vice President respectively of the Prohibition party, nominated at the National convention recently held at Atlantic City.

These are the same men who led their party four years ago. They are clean and strong men.

Mr. Chafin spoke to a large audience in Gresham a few months ago, so that he is not a stranger to many in this locality.

The first plank of the platform deals with the main issue for which the party stands, namely the abolition of the drink traffic. It says:

"The alcoholic drink traffic is wrong; is the most serious drain on the wealth and resources of the nation; is detrimental to the general welfare and destructive of the inalienable rights of life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness. All laws taxing or licensing a traffic which produces crime, poverty and political corruption, and spreads disease and death, should be repealed. To destroy such a traffic there must be elected to power a political party which will administer the government from the standpoint, that the alcoholic drink traffic is a crime and not a business, and we pledge that the manufacture, importation, exportation, transportation and sale of alcoholic beverages shall be prohibited."

The platform declares for equal suffrage, uniform divorce laws and the extermination of polygamy and white slavery.

The party also declares in favor of a presidential term of six years and one term only; the election of United States senators by direct vote; the initiative, referendum and recall.

In regard to the tariff the platform asserts: "As the tariff is a commercial question it should be fixed on the scientific basis of accurate knowledge secured by means of a permanent, anti-partisan tariff commission, with ample powers."

An "equitable graduated income and inheritance tax" is favored, as also conservation of our national resources, and "the protection of one day in seven as a day of rest."

Spraying Cows.
One advantage of spraying cows, according to Pacific Bulletin, is that it will make it unnecessary for the cows to eat so much pasturage since they will not be compelled to exert their strength in fighting the flies; then eating a greater amount of grass to keep up the fight. The quiet assured them by keeping the flies off them will work toward a heavier milk flow and a higher cream test than if the animals were pestered by these blood suckers. No cow can produce the maximum quantity of milk while she is scrapping with great swarms of flies. Then, there is the satisfaction afforded the man who milks the cow that is not continually striking, kicking and switching at flies, which, besides irritating the milkman and the cow, is apt to result in the spilling of a bucketful or two of valuable milk.
