The Portland public schools opened yesterday with an increased attendance of about 10 per cent over one year ago.

The funeral of Mrs. Etta Johnson, white wife of pugilist "Jack" Johnson, was held in Chicago Saturday, she having committed suicide. Throngs of people of all classes white and black, attended.

Sidna Allen and Wesley Edwards, leaders of the Allen clan which "shot up" the courthouse at Hillsville, Va., last March, were arrested at Des Moines Saturday, after having been hunted through several states for the past six months. The shooting occurred March 14, the arrest September 14.

The University of Oregon has established a course in journalism which should be of great benefit in this important field of activity. It is the belief of the universities and is coming to be the belief of many editors that the right kind of university training can be made as valuable to the newspaper man as to the lawyer, doctor, administrator, or writer, none of whom has a more vital influence on the welfare of the state than the editor. More and more of late years university men have been taking up newspaper work and it is now proposed to give them the advantage of special training.

Blind Fanaticism

What blind fanaticism was it that caused General and Countess Nogri to commit suicide together as the Emperor of Japan was being carried to his grave? The hero of Port Arthur, one of the foremost generals of the day, killed himself, and so did his wife, that they might go with their beloved ruler. Japan is becoming rapidly civilized but General Nogri and the Countess were of the past. They came to notice with Japan's advance but were not of this generation. Probably their successors will be less sentimental, but there is no way to fathom the Oriental mind. The Japanese, like the "heathen Chinese," are peculiar.

Race Course Approved

There is a growing sentiment that the standard one-mile race course is too long by half and that the half-mile track is going to be just the proper thing hereafter. Of course the time is a little slower on the shorter course but twice around the track is vastly more entertaining and exciting with a near view than once around a mile course where fully one-half the race is lost to the spectators. The economy of the shorter track is also evident and many of our county fairs can have a half-mile track where a longer one would be impossible, both from lack of room and lack of money. The track at Gresham is only half a mile around. It was lack of space and money that made it so, but it seems that our race promoters got into the fashion of race tracks by a fortunate circumstance that is now quite the fashion.

Since there is no open season for Chinese pheasants it is observed that the birds are getting to be numerous and quite tame. In driving over the country they are to be seen in almost every field and frequently along the roads. It is noticeable, however, that one seldom sees the native pheasant, grouse or quail except in remote localities, and it is thought that they are retreating from civilization. Perhaps they are becoming extinct and it would probably be a good idea to extend the closed season several years longer for their benefit and protection.

County Expenses at Fair

The expense bill for the Multnomah County exhibit at the State Fair sent to the county court by E. L. Thorpe amounted to \$277. He brought back a premium award of \$100, which reduces the cost just that much. As the county court appropriated \$350 for the exhibit, it will be seen nearly one-half of the amount was saved. The total cost of \$177 was cheap advertising, as it is a mere nothing to the benefits that will eventually be derived from the exhibit as many inquiries were made and answered at Salem concerning the resources of Multnomah county. Other counties spend a great deal more for exhibits at Salem than Multnomah county has ever appropriated and they are reaping good results. Notably among these counties are Benton, Marion and Clackamas. They begin a year in advance, however, in arranging for their displays and save up their best exhibits to show again, adding to them each year. Multnomah should do this and keep it up. All other counties should do the same, but there should be district divisions because some counties in Oregon cannot produce the same things that the Willamette valley counties do. The State Fair can be made the biggest and best of all fairs in the United States if the different counties would only compete for adequate prizes, and the State Fair Board is inclined to be liberal because it is desirous of securing so many exhibits that it will be imperative upon the state to provide larger buildings and more of them to house the products of the whole state. The time is coming when the State Fair will be an institution with adequate facilities for taking care of everything and everybody in spite of the weather, and then it will truly be a great institution.
