

PETITION FOR COUNTY SCHOOL

Petitions are being circulated throughout the county to place the question of establishing a county high school fund in Multnomah county, on the ballot at the coming general election.

The county high school fund law provides, says the Oregon Journal, "That a fund shall be created by taxing the property of the entire county and that the money so raised shall be devoted to employing teachers for high schools.

For the second 20 students \$30 each will be paid and for all over 40 students not over \$12.50 each.

"This movement was endorsed by school officers at the school board meeting in Gresham last April unanimously," said Superintendent Robinson.

"Every school authority is behind the movement and heartily indorses it. Everywhere we are having success in interesting people as it means a great deal to parents to have their children receive high school training at home."

The law is now in Lane, Linn, Polk, Union, Jackson and Yamhill counties and is receiving hearty approval. Coos county voters will also consider the adoption of the law at the coming election.

Richards' orchestra has been engaged for the dancing pavilion where dancing will be in full swing every afternoon and evening.

The different events will be published daily in the official program together with a summary of the races of the preceding day.

There will be a few campers on the grounds this year. It is a wonder that more people do not come for the whole week and camp in the grove or some other nearby place.

Claude Smith will have a moving picture show on the grounds and will run both it and the one up town from 11 to 11 each day.

The two silver cups will be awarded in the agricultural and fruit displays. The pair of blankets donated by the Brownsville Woolen Mills company will go to the domestic science department.

Sterling & Kidder will have a booth in the pavilion for the demonstration of Chi-na-mel.

The Beaver Acetylene Gas Works will have a big searchlight doing business in front of the pavilion every night. The gas machine will be in the machinery hall and will furnish light for the Art room.

A daily program made up into a neat pamphlet of 16 pages will be issued under the auspices of the Gresham-Riverside Racing Association.

The association has just had the pavilion decorated over in an attractive style at a cost of \$60.

The cattle shed has been improved by closing the open cables and providing doors for closing at night thus making the stalls warmer and shutting out the draughts that are sometimes harmful to delicate animals.

The grounds are now thoroughly piped and Bull Run water is everywhere. Portland people will be surprised at the quality of water we have here when they taste it.

The dahlia bed and its surrounding circle of other flowering plants is one of the show places. Jack Frost has kindly kept away so far and will probably keep his distance for awhile yet.

About \$700 has been spent by the association this year for permanent improvements and other betterments.

The new furrow this year is a good improvement over the old as it will serve to keep the people more condensed and is in close proximity to the big pavilion.

The strollers seeking amusement besides which the remainder of the grounds will be free from all obstructions in front of the pavilion.

Miss Mary Isom and Miss Nellie Fox have arranged an attractive booth in the second story of the pavilion, representing the Portland public library.

The grange exhibits are going to be a revelation in agriculture. There will be at least four booths that would each win \$100 at the State Fair as a county exhibit.

The races are going to be the big attraction of the Fair. The track is in excellent shape and the horses are arriving.

Season tickets are only one dollar. A wrong impression went out that the price would be more but this is authoritative.

Fifty pupils of the Estacada public school and their teachers will be at the fair on Friday afternoon.

A special train will leave Pleasant Home at 9:30 a. m. on Thursday, returning leaving Gresham at 9 p. m.

NEW USE FOR MOVING PICTURE

The latest application of moving pictures to education is that which gives lively demonstration of good and bad methods of poultry raising.

The daily ration is 7 pounds of bran and three of middlings mixed with buttermilk at morning; wheat and some oats after school; kale hung where they can peck at it; and beef scraps and buttermilk where they can get at it all the time.
