

TRANSFORMERS BURNED OUT

Accident Which Plunged the City in Darkness and Closed the Fair

Saturday night, at a quarter past eight, just at a time when the greatest day of the fair was at its best...

Everybody took the occasion good naturedly and there was no panic or sign of discontent except a keen disappointment that the fair should terminate so suddenly.

The cause of the accident to the electric light plant is ascribed to the extra pull on the transformer at the Gresham sub-station on account of the demand for more current.

The current in use was one of only a few in the whole United States known as a 33 cycle current.

The light current was restored to the city on Sunday evening and the power on Tuesday evening, the light and power current now coming from the plant in North Portland.
