There were evidences of fraudulent ballots which were laid aside because they showed evidences of an attempt to stuff the ballot box. The evidences were unmistakable and could not but arouse suspicion.

The ballots are kept on file and can be seen by any who doubt results.

## DEMOCRATS HOLD RALLY

A rousing democratic rally was held here Wednesday night, the attendance being nearly a hundred. D. M. Roberts presided and in a happy way introduced the eight speakers. Mr. Meyers spoke for Dr. Harry Lane, candidate for United States senator. He was followed by John H. Stevenson who said the people were making politics more of a business than ever before, studying the men and the measures. He, of course, would have all vote for Wilson whom he said was above reproach.

Judge Munly, running for Congress, made a good impression, saying he addressed his hearers not as democrats or republicans, but as citizens.

An ovation was given Tom Word who, though saying less, was perhaps the most popular speaker of the evening.

Our fellow townsman (or nearly so), Mart Kronenberg, running for the legislature, was given a welcome hearing.

Oglesby Young presented his claims for the circuit judgeship. J. Woods Smith, candidate for state senator, showed that he had clear ideas as to some good measures and favored many needed laws. When he thundered, "Vote down the proposed Blue-Sky law, now on the ballot," in favor of a better one, the chairs suddenly slipped from under two strong men and they came down with a thud, giving emphasis to the remarks.

Benj. Brick, though last, and smallest, of the speakers, was not least, for he held the audience spell bound while exclaiming his interesting views of legislation.

Being the first pre-election rally, it was a decided success.

The ladies of the W. C. T. U. at their meeting on Thursday passed resolutions thanking Mrs. S. S. Thompson for opening her home for the reception to the teachers, also to Kirk Thompson for conveying many of the guests by automobile to and from the house. Those who assisted in any way during the evening were also given a vote of thanks.

## Troops on Long March

Three batteries of the second U. S. field artillery passed through Gresham this morning on their way to Vancouver. In their practice they fired 2000 rounds each shot costing \$7. No attempt was made to break records, only practice in gunnery being the object.

The batteries left the Warm Springs on Tuesday and yesterday made a record march of 33 miles from McIntyres. A mule loaded with nearly 400 pounds went over a cliff yesterday and was killed, this being the only incident of the trip worth mentioning.
