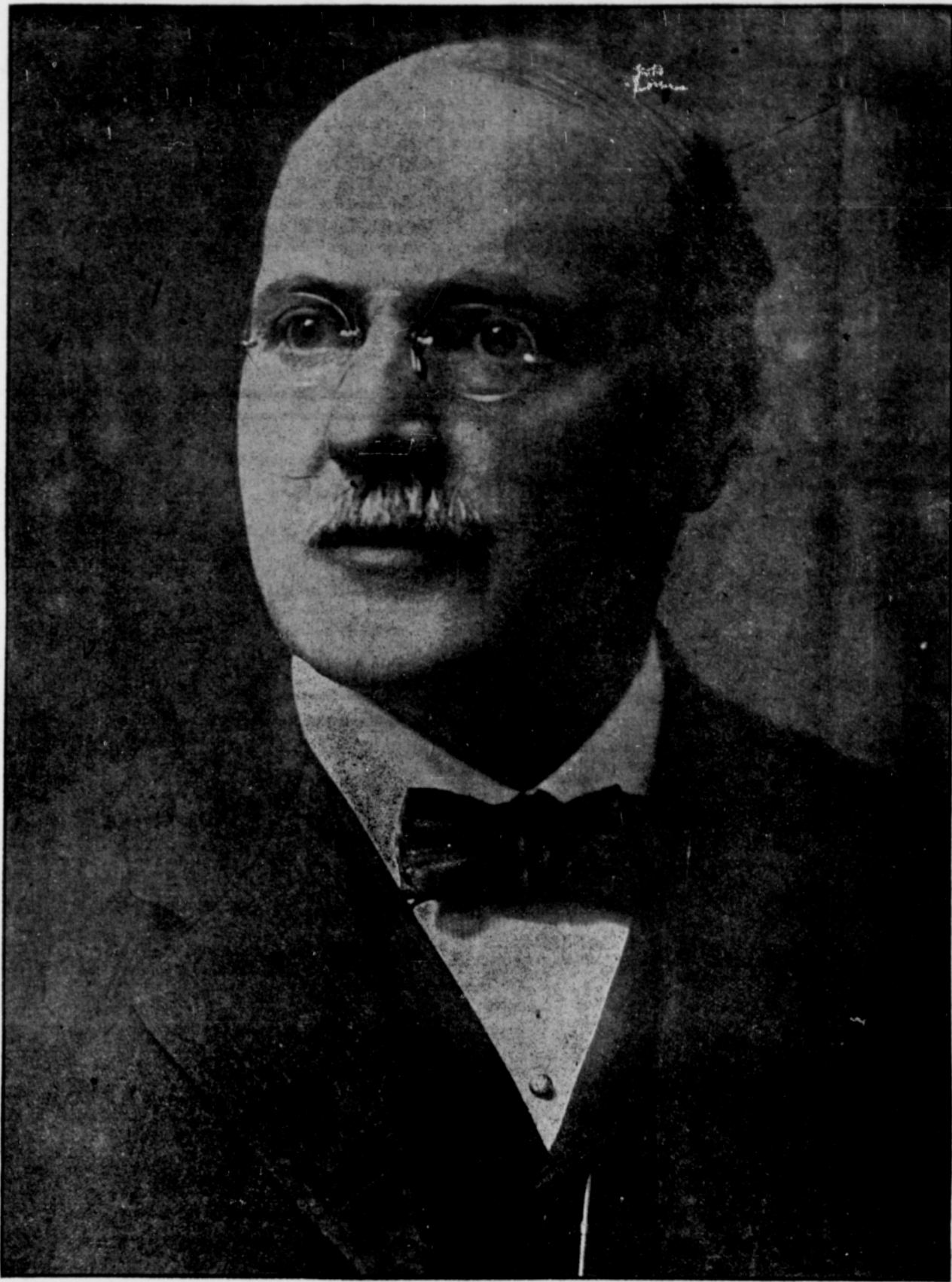

The potato blight this summer was caused by the frequent rains which fell so regularly every week or two. It is not common in Oregon and will probably not occur again until another excessive mist summer comes around. However, to prevent its recurrence next year, even with favorable conditions, the grower should not use seed from fields where the blight has occurred. Then, as a further precaution, spray at least once with bordeaux mixture and oftener if damp weather prevails.

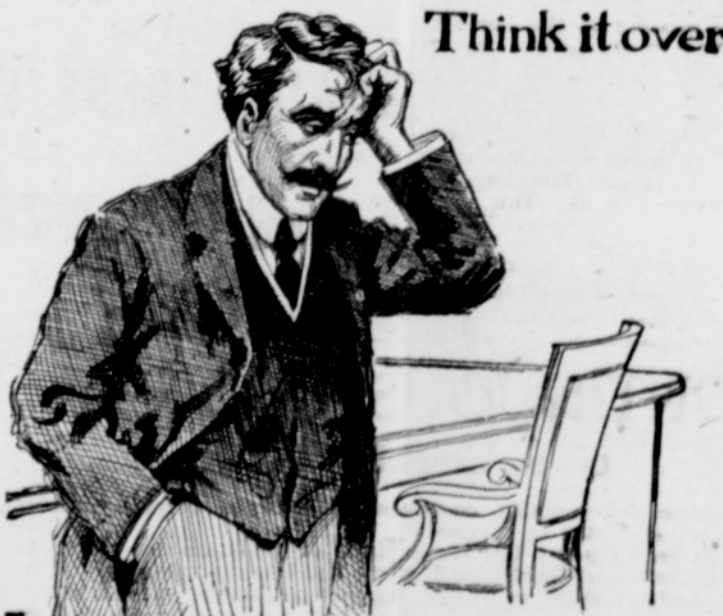
