## LIBRARY, HALL AND FOUNTAIN

With two public buildings going up in Gresham just now and a publice fountain in prospect the signs of prosperity are rather in the ascendant. The new municipal building, which is costing \$3000, is already up to the second floor and son. still going up at a rapid pace. It will be finished in less than a month longer, in fact it will be ready for the last meeting of the present city council this year and before their successors are installed. It will be a handsome structure of concrete blocks with just enough ornamentation to make it attractive to the eye, and with every facility for the purposes to which it will be

The new Carnegie library already shows something of its imposing appearance when it shall be completed. The frames for the panelled Lofgren, (Dem.) walls are up but they give only a poor idea of how the building will look when finished. That it will cost \$10,000 is sufficient evidence that it will not be a cheap structure as the wooden frame would suggest, and the public must wait to see the finish of the building before its real beauty and solidity can be appreciated. It will go ahead at a surprising pace and will be occupied on schedule time.

The fountain to be built at the intersection of Main and Powell streets is of lesser importance than the two buildings mentioned but it will be of inestimable benefit when finished. Its cost will be about \$300 and it will be of rather plain architecture, but as a boon to man and beast it will have an importance that cannot be measured in money or style.
