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A LOCAL ISSUE.

In the coming election there is only one question that affects Gresham directly as a municipality and that is the question of saloon or no saloon. By a strong petition of the citizens this question is placed upon the ballots. It will probably come at the very bottom of the nearly two score of questions on which the voter is asked to exercise his franchise. It is liable to be overlooked, especially by some who are not very outspoken either for or against the saloon. A few good people have strong convictions on the subject and would rather miss voting for president than fail to vote "no" against the saloon. Many there are who will vote in its favor. It is a matter of business with them and that's the only sentiment or conviction they feel.

It is the large number who are inclined to be indifferent who are appealed to on grounds of morality and civic righteousness to help rid our community of the saloons.

The cry of those who favor it is that to vote out the saloons will kill the town. Various supposed instances are cited to show this supposed inevitable result. But most of the instances cited were winning or frontier towns, and the rough element of course moved on and the town was "killed." It stands to reason, and is a fact, that few towns and cities having a large proposition of peaceable, sober citizens and home owners, who desire good schools, and clean morals, will be killed by the going out of the saloons. The trade that is brought to a town by the saloon is not the most desirable trade.

Dr. Chas. M. Sheldon, the famous Kansas author and preacher, in an address before the Portland Woman's club last week, told of the success of the prohibition law in his home state, after its operation for 32 years, and said that as a result of it Kansas was second in the per capita wealth, and first in the per capita home ownership, while there was but one pauper to each 1200 citizens.

There need be little fear that to vote out the saloon would kill Gresham. Certain it is that character is worth more than towns and cities. Therefore let everyone vote to make Gresham one of the cleanest, most orderly and safe cities possible and our citizens will be better off every way and no doubt our city will grow.

Mark your ballot 314 X Yes, which means place all public utilities corporations under the control of the Railway Commission. There is now no general law controlling such concerns. The various municipalities try to control them by special ordinances, but they ought to be under the supervision and direction of the Railway Commission. Be sure and vote 314 X Yes.

"IF."
If, in the election for president next Tuesday, neither party receives a majority in the electoral college the day will be hastened when the cumbersome machinery for electing presidents will be discarded for something more simple and more in harmony with popular ideas. That the present system is outworn and antiquated is evident enough, but the people are slow to move. That "if" is a big one this time, and portentous, for it means that the Oregon primary system is going to spread further into every state and that in time the people will elect their president themselves. That "if" means more. It means that the direct election of United States senators is sure to come with the election of president by the people and that there are going to be other offices filled by election that are now filled by appointment.

But the biggest thing that "if" will do will be done if Roosevelt is elected. The one-term idea is fast taking hold of the people of this country and right here will be the opportunity to bring such a condition as one-term for president about. While we have no fears of the nation drifting into a monarchy yet there is a sentiment, wide-spread at that, which would limit the presidency to one term. It is based on the principle that the country is full of big men fit for the office and that no one should hold any office for life. Then, too, the office that Washington refused again is deemed by many too sacred for any of his successors. So there is a job cut out for "if" and we think it is going to get busy from now on, more especially so if Roosevelt is the winner.

This year the farmers' week at the Oregon Agricultural College, which has hitherto always preceded or followed the winter short course immediately, is to be held Dec. 9-14, and the short course Jan. 6-14, 7. The change was made because it was found that Oregon farmers can leave their home duties more easily at that time, just before Christmas, than at any other. It is manifestly impossible to place the full short course of four weeks (besides the farmers' week) at that season, since none would care to be away from home at either Thanksgiving or Christmas time.

Like the short course, the farmers' week is crowded full of lectures and practical demonstrations calculated to solve the daily problems of farm life. Dairying, fruit growing, truck gardening, stock raising, the use and care of farm machinery, farm use of concrete, soils and crop rotations, drainage and irrigation, and a vast number of similar topics of vital interest to the man who is getting his living off his acres, are included in the program.

Boy scouts at LaGrande have been "swatting" the fly. They turned their attention to wiping out the winged disease spreaders and the winner in the contest was credited with having killed 5,000,000 flies. It is estimated that over 12,000,000 of the pests were killed in LaGrande during the campaign.

A state convention of manufacturers is being planned for Portland during Land Show week, Nov. 18-23. It is thought by linking the two interests, agricultural production and industrial development, much good can be accomplished for Oregon. The Manufacturers' association is behind the convention plan.

It will cost approximately one and three-quarters million dollars to run the state institutions during the coming two years, according to the budget being made for action by the next legislature. This is somewhat less than was appropriated at the last session for like purposes.

Individual orchardists and farmers in large numbers have entered for the attractive cash and other prizes offered for box and plate displays of apples, pears, nuts, and other products.

There will be lectures and demonstrations given by experts in their respective lines on all subjects of interests to the orchardists and farmers.

The Oregon State Horticultural So-

ciety will hold its annual meeting for three days during the same week, with papers and discussions by experts and practical authorities.

The Pacific International Dairy Show Association will also hold their annual show in the same dates at North Portland, Oregon.

The Manufacturers' Association of Portland is arranging for a state convention of all the manufacturers of Oregon to be held during the same week.

Special district excursions are being arranged for by the railroad, and a day will be set aside for each district.
