**ORDINANCE NO. 65**

An ordinance providing the manner of nominating officers and providing for general and special elections:

Be it ordained by the Common Council of the town of Gresham: Section 1. A regular election shall be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday of December

of each year, which shall be known as the general town election, and all other elections shall be known as special town elections. At the regular town election officers, as provided in the charter of the Town of Gresham, shall be elected to serve for a period of one year.

Section 2. The manner of nominating elective officers shall be as follows:

(a) There shall be a public mass meeting held at such time and place within the Town of Gresham as the Council may determine by resolution, provided such meeting shall be held at least three weeks before the time of the general town election. The resolution fixing the time and place of said mass meeting shall direct the town Recorder to post three notices of said meeting in three public places within said town of Gresham and publish the same in the official newspaper for two successive issues prior to the holding of said meeting. The said notices shall state the time, place and purpose of said mass meeting and the officers to be nominated. The said mass meeting shall be governed as far as possible by Robert's Rules of Order and shall be called to order by the Town Recorder. There may be nominated for each office to be filled not more than four persons who shall file their acceptance of said nomination with the Town Recorder not later than seven days after their nomination. Any persons who fails to so file his acceptance shall not be entitled to have his name placed on the ballot.

(b) It shall also be permissible to nominate candidates for office by petition signed by ten per cent of the total number of votes cast at the last town election. The form of petition shall be substantially as follows:

I do hereby join in a petition for the nomination of ..... for the office of ..... to be voted for at the general town

election to be held on the ..... day of ..... 19..... I certify that I am a qualified voter in the Town of Gresham, Oregon. All petitions shall be presented to the Recorder for filing not later than the date of the annual meeting heretofore referred to, not later than ten days before the general town election. All nominations tendered by petition shall be accepted in writing at least ten days before the general town election and filed with the Town Recorder and if not so accepted the name of such candidates shall be entitled to be placed on the ballot.

Section 3. It is hereby made the duty of the Town Recorder to post written notices of all general and special elections in three public places within the Town of Gresham, at least ten days before the time of such election and the names of officers to be elected or the names of candidates to be voted upon.

Section 4. At the time of the passage of the resolution fixing the time and place of the said mass meeting, the Council shall appoint two judges and three clerks of election who shall serve at all elections to be held in the Town of Gresham for a period of one year who shall receive as compensation for their services the sum of \$5.00 per day.

Section 5. The polling places shall open at one o'clock p. m. and close at seven o'clock p. m., and is hereby made the duty of the Town Recorder to prepare and use all blanks and ballots to be used at the polling places.

Section 6. The general election laws of the State of Oregon, so far as they are applicable, shall apply to all elections in the Town of Gresham.
