Certainly the league does not want to draw Minnesota people to Montana, Oregon, Washington or Idaho. Neither can Minnesota hope to get any people from those states. The thing to do, if it is to be done at all, is to present the opportunities of the seven states, together, in a big show, in the east, where the visitor to the show may see for himself what every state has to offer, and make his own choice as to future residence or place of investment.

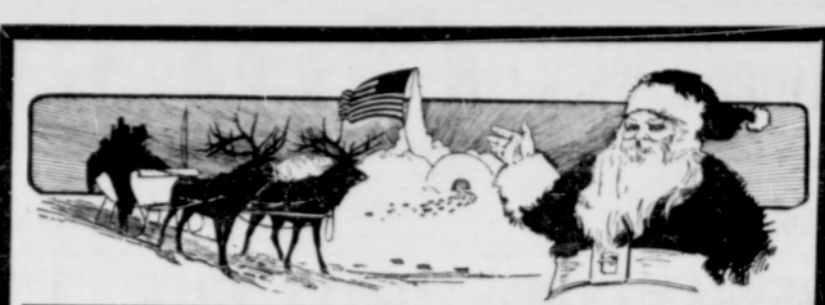
