Authentic news has been received by the relatives of the death of the late H. H. Hawkins who died at Boise City, Idaho. Mr. Hawkins was well known in this vicinity, his father and mother, Squire and Lucinda Hawkins, being among the pioneers of Powell Valley, where Henry spent his younger days before going to the mines at Quartzburg, Idaho. He returned on a visit to his parents and was married to Miss Sarah Richey of Pleasant Valley. Mrs. Hawkins was buried at Placerville, Idaho. His second marriage was a failure although his second wife was in Boise at the time of his death, her home being in California. Henry after spending all his life in mines, making more money than a mule could carry, died penniless and was laid beside his wife at Placerville.

On Tuesday evening, January 14, the new city council consisting of Wm. Bulter, mayor, and D. W. McKay, Cal. Shepherd, Cedric Stone, Edwin Burlingame, D. S. Dunbar and hold-over E. E. Heslin, will take the city's reins in hand and will look after the interests of the people for the next year.

A tax of 10 mills has been levied for the year of 1912. The estimated value of our city is \$55,825. This does not include the public service corporations which is estimated at \$74,875.
