Mount Tabor Gets More Water.

The water committee has completed the new high service water reservoir for the Mount Tabor district on the north side of Mount Tabor. It takes the place of the old wooden tank that stood there for a number of years. The new reservoir, has a capacity of 200,000 gallons and has raised the pressure on the mains from 40 to 60 pounds throughout that district. Water is pumped into this reservoir from the lower reservoir and the pressure is kept up at all times. It stands in Mount Tabor Park and is an attractive structure.

The Mount Tabor Progressive club, organized two months ago, will undertake to have the Mount Tabor Park improved some even this year. Some of the streets in this park were graded out last year and some other minor improvements were made in the way of stands.
