While at play in the school yard, Geln Loundree, fell and broke his collar bone. He is rapidly improving under the care of Dr. Barendrick and will soon be back to school.

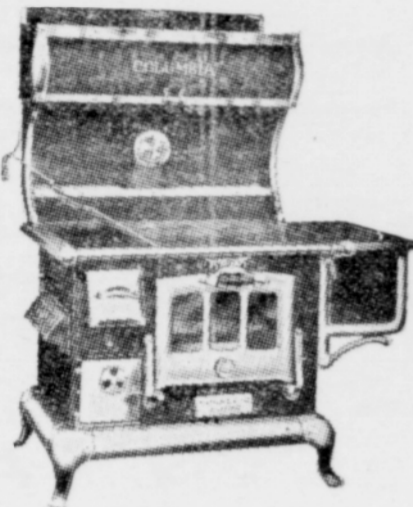
