**LEAVING THE FARM.**

Several well known farmers of Eastern Multnomah, who have toiled for twenty years or more in developing fine properties, and who have raised families of children now grown up, are renting their places and retiring from active work. In most cases they are able to retire, having secured a competency to which will be added their rental money, but it is noticeable that many of them have been deserted by their grown sons and daughters who have gone at it to make their own ways in the world.

Many lengthy articles have been written on the subject of keeping the boys on the farm. Of the girls nothing is said, as it is expected that they will get married and leave anyhow; but with the boys it is different. As soon as a boy is his own master he looks about for himself and pretty soon his father and mother find themselves left alone on the farm with all the work it entails falling upon their aged shoulders. It is not to be wondered at that they seek to be relieved of the farm work that has been suddenly thrown back upon them after being used to the help of their children, nor that they desire to live in more ease and comfort after so many years of toil and drudgery. They take the first good offer that comes along and either sell the homestead or lease it—more often the latter—and take life easy.

But what about the boy? Can any one blame him for trying to better his condition? Not all of them are fitted to be farmers for life. Some of them have ambitions to become proficient in other callings, and the world is full of prominent men who began life as a farmer boy but early grew out of their surroundings and made their impress upon the affairs of their country. Some who went out to do for themselves have made failures and came back with more experience, but many more do not come back despite their failures.

So it will always be and the situation will grow worse as the advance in education continues, for the farmer's boy or girl who once gets a taste of higher knowledge in high school, college or university rarely considers that the farm is the proper sphere for the exercise of his or her abilities.

Here is what we consider a pertinent topic for the Patron-Teachers' associations. It is something for them to discuss without hope of arriving at a solution, but it will always remain a fruitful theme for speculation. The genius who can solve the problem will have reached the apex of the associations' in this direction.

While the taxpayers are congratulating themselves on a reduction in taxes this year, amounting to about 20 per cent, they should be preparing themselves for a boost next year that will make them ask "Why a legislature?"

Washington's governor has vetoed the bill providing for a bridge across the Columbia at Vancouver. It is quite likely that one will be built anyway with a chance that it will be paid for by state aid two years hence.

Livestock raising throughout Eastern Oregon has increased to such an extent that the O. W. R. & N. Co. has inaugurated a tri-weekly special livestock train service from Huntington to Portland. Its present twice-a-week service has been found to be insufficient.

Farmers near St. Paul, Oregon, have formed a co-operative creamery association, following the plan of the Tillamook dairy farmers which has been found so successful. Mount Angel has such an establishment already. There is a broad field for farmers and horticulturists in this state to make common cause with their neighbors in marketing their products and the results are bound to be mutually profitable.

Senator Lane and Representatives Lafferty and Sinnott have called on the new attorney general, James C. Reynolds, at Washington, and urged the speedy prosecution of the Oregon & California Railroad Land Grant Suit. The case was fully explained to the attorney general by Representative Lafferty, and his argument was supplemented by Senator Lane and Representative Sinnott. It was stated at the deparment that the delay up to this date was very much regretted, and it was promised that B. D. Townsend would be allowed to devote all of his time to this case from now on, and that it would be rapidly pushed to a final decision in the supreme court. Both Lafferty and Lane stated that they would keep after the case from now on and not permit it to lag at any time in the future, if possible to prevent it. Senator Lane stated to the attorney general that he is receiving numerous letters from settlers who have gone on the lands, urging a speedy settlement of the case.

Encouraged by the success of its initial performance, the Pacific Northwest Land Products show will hold a second and larger exposition of soil wealth next fall. An organization for the coming show has been formed and officers elected. The dates are November 1-8. Exhibits of all soil products, both fruits and vegetables, are wanted, and farmers throughout the Northwest states are urged to plant their crops this year with the idea in mind of placing their best samples on display in Portland and competing for the many prizes to be offered.
