### Potato Cake.

One cup butter, 4 tablespoons ground chocolate, 2 cups sugar, 1 cup mashed potatoes (warm) 2 cups flour, sifted after measuring; half cup sweet milk, 1 cup chopped walnuts, 1 teaspoonful vanilla, 1 teaspoonful altogether, of cinnamon, and cloves, 2 teaspoonful baking powder, 1 cup seeded raisins, 4 eggs. Beat sugar and butter to cream; add potatoes and blend until creamy, then add milk, eggs, flour, baking powder, nuts, raisins and chocolate. The nuts and raisins should have half cup extra flour sifted over them and be thoroughly mixed before putting into the batter. Bake slowly in well buttered tin for 1 1/4 hours.—Alida Culy.
