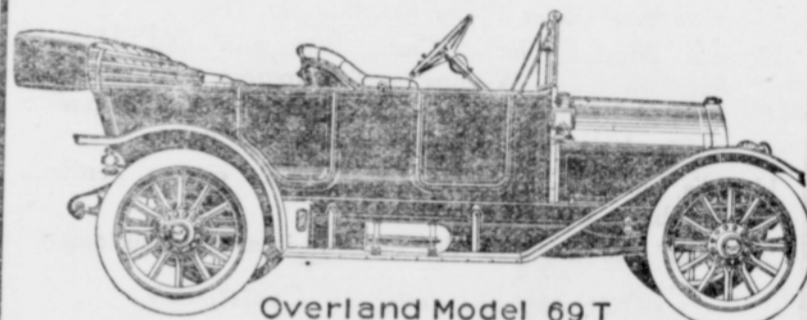

**Notice of Special Municipal Election.**

Notice is hereby given that a petition has been presented to the common council of the town of Gresham, Multnomah county, State of Oregon, requesting that the boundaries of said town of Gresham be changed so as to include new and additional territory within such boundaries, same being as follows, to-wit:

Beginning at a point where the east line of the town of Gresham intersects the north line of the A. Meyers tract in section ten (10) township 1 north range 3 east, W. M. and running thence east to east line of east half of southeast quarter of section 10 in said township and range, and thence following said line south to the northeast corner of the northwest quarter of the northeast quarter of said section 15; thence south following the east line of the northwest quarter of the northeast quarter of said section 15 to an intersection of said line with the Damascus road; thence west following the south line of the northwest quarter of the northeast quarter of said section to an intersection of said line with the east line of the railroad right of way of the Portland, Railway & Light Power company; thence in a general northwesterly direction following the east line of said railroad right of way to a point where the present boundary line of said town of Gresham intersects said east line of said railroad right of way and there ending.

And as said petition was signed by more than one-fifth of the legal voters of the town of Gresham as shown by the vote cast at the last municipal election held therein the said common council has ordered that a special election be held at which the proposition proposed by said petition shall be submitted to the legal voters of said town of Gresham and of the territory to be annexed.

That said special election is called to be held in the town of Gresham on the 11th day of April, 1913. That at said election the legal voters of the town of Gresham and of said territory proposed to be annexed are invited to attend and vote on said proposition of increasing and changing the boundary limits of the town of Gresham so as to include new and additional territory as hereinbefore specifically set out and said voters are requested to express themselves on said proposition by placing upon their ballot at said special election the words "for annexation" or "against an-

nexation" or other equivalent words expressing their preference; that the polling place fixed for the holding of said election shall be at the City Hall and that the polls will be open for the holding of said election between the hours of one o'clock p. m. and 7 o'clock p. m., on April 11th, 1913.
