

### STOCK LAW ELECTION WAS OUT OF JOINT.

Two negatives don't make an affirmative, and the wise guy who wrote the ballot heads at the last election has just been informed that he should have known as much when he wrote the one for the initiative stock law in Clackamas county last fall.

It might have been Secretary O'cott, or Attorney General Crawford or some school kid at Oregon City, but he got things mixed. Whoever it was must have played hookey for a day or two while at school just at the time his grammar class was learning the difference between negatives and affirmatives. He has learned his lesson now. Here is what he put on the ballot for the intelligent voters of Clackamas county to "wrestle" with:

"For stock running at large—Yes."

"Against stock running at large—No."

The voters took their choice, voted either way and the result was the same—all of them voted for stock to run at large, yet the law was declared to be carried. But Circuit Judge Campbell has decided that there was no election.

The form, as prescribed by the legislative law of 1907, indicates that the same title for the matter to be voted upon shall precede both the words "yes" and "no." In ruling the present vote inadequate to express popular opinion in the matter, the judge, after reviewing the statement printed on the ballot, says:

"No fair interpretation can be given the words as they appeared

upon the ballot, using their ordinary meaning, save that every elector who voted was in favor of stock running at large."

And so the so-called law is knocked out and stock need not be kept off the county roads of Clackamas until some other law is passed to keep them off.
